True Tales of Nacogdoches Lawmen

A Burglar in Our Midst...His Luck Just Ran Out!

IT WAS JUST AFTER MIDNIGHT, MID MARCH, 1981, AND 'CLYDE' WAS BARKING IN THE DRIVEWAY AND TOWARD RAGUET STREET.

Only one week after my late wife, Sara Bess, and I married, Clyde, the Border Collie, wakes us up barking. I went out to check and whatever he had seen, had made it out to the street. I did not think it was serious.

I WAS WRONG.

Just after 7:30 am as I head to work at the University Police Department where I was the CID Sergeant, I found a straightened piece of clothes hanger on the tool box of my truck, and that my doors had been unlocked. I quickly checked and found that a pistol and Remington pump shotgun were still there... strange for a burglar to have left.

I then checked Sara Bess' Buick and found it too, had been entered. Several school files were dumped in the seat. Her CB radio was still in the car. Strange!

I ran inside and said, "We had a burglar but he did not take anything." She responded, "My gosh....the watch!!"

I said, "The what?" She said, "Daddy's Rolex!" She ran to the glove box and said, "Its gone!" She then began to explain that the watch, having been locked up in a safety deposit since January, 1968, had been taken out the day before in order to have it cleaned before giving it to me....now its gone!

Any police officer faced with those facts in a theft case would say that it was taken by someone who knew it was there, or they were seeing an insurance rip off. The answer to both of those was a resounding, NOT IN THIS CASE. And... why were the guns not taken??

Sergeant Archie McKnight, Technical Services Detective with the Nacogdoches Police Department soon arrived to dust for prints on both vehicles plus my jeep that was in the garage.

Shield soap that had just come in the mail. The box was torn open and the soap was taken. (And, my night-time visitor had left the most beautiful thumbprint possible!!) Later, when a suspect was arrested, we already had his print to match! I went on in to work, still perplexed about this crime. Nothing made sense....who knew?....why leave the guns!

After getting off at 5 pm that evening, the University still owned me. We had to immediately report to the Johnson Coliseum and work double header basketball games. Finally, getting back home about 10:30 pm that night, I went straight to the garage and began taking things in. What was I seeing? The 45 auto

magazine that had been picked up and 7 rounds thumbed out. The first aid box in the jeep that was gone through. The freezer that had been opened. In the store room some empty pill boxes opened and turned upside down. Sara Bess came out and said there were four new plant lights still in their boxes....gone. Suddenly it all came into focus, no matter what else developed, this was a thieving "pill head" that happened to have scored big with the watch.

I had known of other burglaries in and around Raguet for several months.... even before Christmas, and thought we were being careful. Now, we are his latest victims!

The most troubling nearby burglary was that of neighbor and long time family friend, District Judge Jack Pierce, presiding Judge of the 145th District Court of Nacogdoches County...here, the burglar returned weeks later in another attempt.

THE JUDGE'S INTRUDER:

With the family upstairs and asleep one night, the burglar entered and actually The most obvious thing out of place was that near my jeep was a sample of opened Christmas presents, while also eating food from the refrigerator. When







this type crime hits, one tends to think that it is not random, but targeted. This adds tremendously to the stress and fear that develops among family members. Are they being stalked by someone that the Judge had sentenced?

THE SECOND ATTEMPT:

A few weeks later at midnight, I was with a UPD patrol officer and told him to head up Pecan St., then cut down Zeno to Raguet so we could check on the Judge's house. As we approached Raguet, to the left, we saw a car parked, just as another one came southbound down the street. This car had 'out of state' plates.... so we followed that one and stopped it....it was ok. We then got a call to campus and did not get back to check the other vehicle out.

Thus, our burglar, maybe from that other car, returned to the Judge's home as a family member was returning home. She glimpsed someone in the bushes as she entered and reported to the Judge. The family saw the prowler in the garage as he was looking in a window at them!! He escaped again.

MORE ACTIVITY

In January and February, more burglaries were occurring. The burglar entered one house on East California St. where food was taken from a freezer....and a few weeks later....that freezer was hit again. The home owner then wired an alarm up to the freezer....and waited. He did not have long to wait.


LAST NIGHT OF FREEDOM

About ten days after our burglary in mid-March, I got a 2 am phone call from Mike Kelly at UPD. He said the "Nacogdoches Police Department has arrested a burglar and Lt. John Walton wants you to call him." I called John and he said, "I think we have your burglar....meet us here at 8 am.

THEY HAD HIM! But he isn't talking!

Watching from an adjoining room, I observed two Detectives try to talk to him. He simply had nothing to say. The third one asked me to go in with him and be seated. This detective looked at the suspect and said nothing, except to give

him a cold, hard stare. He suddenly slaps the desk hard and stands up to leave.

The Detective quietly whispers to me as he turns, "Its your turn."

The suspect's first name is Steven and I say to him, quietly, "Whew, you really pissed him off!" He said, "I saw that."

I said, "Steven, do you understand your rights as they were read to you earlier?"

He said, "Yes, I do."

I added, "We know you took the watch...where is it?"

He calmly answered, "In the night stand by my bed."

BAMM BAMM goes my heart as I conceal any reaction from him!

I glance up and see the reactions from officers in the adjoining room and behind his back!

I then tell him that I have a 'consent to search form' and I need him to read it and consider signing it....He did and we did!!

He lived in an apartment on Pecan St. near the Fredonia Bank and had been doing burglaries for months. He traveled three different ways to commit his crimes......and there were many of them. He had a motorcycle, a car, and his feet. His mode of transportation, therefore, limited him in what he could steal on a particular night. He was a full time SFA student from the Longview area. He was stealing food to eat, stealing medications, plus stealing gold and silver.

In his night stand was Jack Brookshire's Rolex watch, plus jewelry from several other prominent people. He had marijuana growing under the plant lights he took from Sara Bess. He had also taken a hunting bag from our garage and had it filled with food.

HIS CAPTURE:

I will conclude with the story of his 2 am capture. This was done by a tough man, and friend, who was also an upset homeowner. He was armed with his Browning 12 gauge Automatic Shotgun. This was now Steven's third time to be stealing food from this same freezer in 4 or so weeks. After the second burglary, an alarm was hooked up to the freezer door. When the remote alarm sounded in his bedroom, the homeowner eased to his freezer room, flashed a light on, and leveled the Browning shotgun at the suspect. Then he heard, "Please sir.....I am just a poor, hungry college student. I am stealing food just to be able to eat!"

The first words the poor, hungry college student heard were priceless...

"SHUT UP YOU SON OF A \$##%\$. I AM TRYING TO DECIDE WHETHER TO CALL THE POLICE BEFORE OR AFTER I SHOOT YOU!!"


HIS DAY IN COURT:





The Neuropathy Treatment Clinics of Texas -Helping to Put a Spring Back in Your Step and a Smile on Your Face

Neuropathy Treatment Clinics of Texas, with locations in Tyler and Addison, Texas have been treating patients in the northeast Texas area for almost two years, helping patients find relief from chronic peripheral neuropathy, with a non-invasive and non-pharmaceutical solution. According to Mackey

Smith, Clinic Director of the Tyler location, in this past year alone they have graduated more than two hundred patients from their program.

"Our graduates all noted greatly reduced, and in some cases, complete relief from their neuropathy symptoms." Smith said.

According to Smith, peripheral neuropathy is a result of damage to the nerves located outside of the brain and spinal cord, often with symptoms of burning, tingling, weakness and numbness, usually in the hands or feet. It is divided into three categories, based on the source of the neuropathy, the most common being diabetic neuropathy. Nerves can be damaged by high blood sugar levels. Chemo-Induced neuropathy can sometimes occur in patients who have been treated with chemotherapy. Additionally, nerves can be damaged through alcohol and drug use. New patients will first meet with one of the providers who will perform a physical exam and review their medical history. Treatments are approximately 30 minutes long and are scheduled twice a week for a total of 24 treatments. In cases of severe neuropathy, additional treatments may be required. For the program to be successful, the patient needs to be committed and willing to work toward graduation.

Smith added, "We compare our treatment program to starting the 1st grade in school. We are having to re-educate your nerves and that takes time. Every week you progress until you reach "graduation."

"Patients who suffer from chronic (longer than six months) peripheral neuropathy may be a candidate for their program," Smith said.

The treatments consist of Electric Cell Signaling Treatment (EST), which is the use of electric signal energy waves produced by an ultra-high digital frequency generator. It is a non-invasive signal directed into the treatment area to "imitate, exhaust or block" certain functions of the nerve fibers, resulting in the reduction in neuropathy symptoms. This technology is not new. In fact, it was FDA approved

in 2004, however, only recently has computer software advanced to maximize the delivery of energy waves."

The most rewarding part of the job, Smith says, "is when their patients, or "graduates" tell us they are back doing the things they used to do,




like working in their yard, walking their dog, not using canes or walkers. We love helping people get their life back."

If you go to their web page, there are a number of testimonials from neuropathy sufferers who have finally found relief from symptoms they thought were not treatable.

The Neuropathy Treatment Clinics of Texas accepts Medicare and most private insurances. In many instances, it is not necessary to get a physician's referral, unless insurance requires it for treatment.

Back In Town, Roaming the Streets Again

Last time we visited we talked about various shops, stores, businesses, and office locations in downtown 'Doches in the deep depression stages of the mid- 1930s—also took a look at some of the fine old residences on both sides of North Street heading from Main Street up North toward the College. All of us still here in our locale know what ours and similar East Texas downtowns per se are all about these days—still viable, often revitalized or reinvigorated due to remodeling, but different as to comparable uses—most small town professional offices, stores, shopping venues are on wider and accessible thoroughfares with the downtowns most often harboring entities for pedestrians, town visitors for foot traffic; or so it seems.

It isn't the same as it was "way back when" and just about all community activity transpired in the few blocks long and few blocks wide local venues. Some of us mourn or lament the transitioning, but we must remember now so many of the larger towns and most cities have downtown areas that are deserted and have fallen into disrepair and in some instances are in dangerous or dilapidated condition. Seems to me that other than in big urban areas with not much room beyond the bricked up and built up edifices there aren't as enthusiastic instances "close in" as once there were. I'm not saying such condition is good or bad, but it seems evident and ongoing in my admittedly tunneled view.

I miss much about the downtown activities that I regularly enjoyed seemingly not so long ago. There didn't need to be need of a reason to have a parade. Who doesn't love a parade? My family loved parade days because 40 or 50 of the folks standing 3 or 4 deep in front of our drugstore watching the bands would post-parade come into the drugstore and all buy cold drinks or ice cream at the soda fountain. While I don't remember proverbial Easter parades or any Thanksgiving parade here, I certainly remember that when Santa Claus came to town he sashayed sled and all through downtown before landing in Toyland on the mezzanine floor of Cason Monk Hardware Store. Nothing made them gather on the sidewalks like a parade with marching bands. My father told me about Ringling Brothers coming here in the 1920s prior to the circus performing in an area back near what is now some vacant land between Texas Street and Martinsville Street; there being a big parade beginning at the train station where the circus animals and equipment unloaded, coming up

the West Main hill, through town, and then on to the grounds, using even some of the animals (elephants mainly) to push and carry equipment, bleachers, tents. They (Ringling Brothers) were such paragons of efficiency that the U.S. Army took lessons from them on how to effectively and economically as to time, effort, coordination expeditiously get from one place to another when equipment, troops, war materiel were the primary targets of relocation.

I can remember once every two or three years when some group or gathering or association having to do with vintage or antique cars would come here and parade the maybe 100 examples of fine Model T's, roadsters, woodies and other desirables



through and around downtown prior to setting up their friendly and accommodating display areas at the fairgrounds or hotel parking lots.

How about homecoming parades—high school or Stephen F. Austin Lumberjacks? I don't recall the numbers exactly, but I'd be not far off guessing 20-25 area high schools or organizations' bands strutting their stuff through downtown—not to mention the accompanying decorated floats, Shriners on mini-cycles, local firetrucks, convertibles carrying local constabulary "Stars," with baton twirlers and drum majors included. What a time. I'm told that even "way back when" some 10,000 folks might gather for this or that reason to be displayed via organized marches with bands through town. I can't tell you how they planned it and carried it out, but they did so seemingly to us kids very smoothly and efficiently. Nearly always there were some horses to prance on the parade pavement—most often the kinds of gaited horses I personally enjoy, ridden mainly by my African American friends. What's not to like about a streaking, striding, strolling, strutting, single-footing, exemplary equine participant?!

Those were some of the days that we wished would never end. Other events have taken their place perhaps but I don't think they've adequately replaced them by any means. Hope there are others of you out there that hold on desperately to the reminiscing of the better past times such as herein reflected upon. Just saying, you know...







Mr. Plastic Fantastic

"Stupid people spend their money as fast as they get it." Proverbs 21:20b (GN)

We are used to seeing warning labels. There are warning labels that will alert you to inhaling fumes at the gas station, opening hot radiators, drinking diet soft drinks, smoking cigarettes, wearing seatbelts, and even letting small children play with plastic bags that cover the clothes that come from the dry cleaners.

These warnings are all designed to make us aware of potential dangers that could bring us great harm.

But when was the last time you saw a warning label on a dollar bill, or a stock certificate, or a bank deposit, or on a credit card? Imagine receiving in the mail a letter that says, "Congratulations, you have been selected to become a slave. Just fill out the enclosed card and return it in the pre-paid envelope and your slavery will begin on the 15th of next month." That's what is written in invisible ink in all of those credit card offers that come in the mail.

Walter Cavanagh of Santa Clara, California, would agree. He has great credit. So great, in fact, that it takes a wallet nearly as long as a football field to carry his credit cards. He owns 1,497 valid credit cards with a potential credit line of about \$1.7 million. He has a place in the Guinness Book of World Records which gives him his nickname: "Mr. Plastic Fantastic." He also holds the title for the world's largest wallet, a thirty-eight pound monster that is 250 feet long and can hold 800 cards. Most of his collection is kept in bank safety deposit boxes, however.

Here are seven signs that you need help with your debt:

- 1. Your credit card balances are rising while your income is decreasing.
- 2. You are only paying the minimum amounts required (or less).
- 3. You constantly charge more each month than you make in payments.
- 4. You don't know how much you owe and really don't want to find out.
- 5. You have received phone calls or letters about delinquent bill payments.

Have you or someone you know ever said, "I don't know where all my money goes!"? Proverbs 27:23 (LB) reads, "Riches can disappear fast...so watch your business interests closely. Know the state of your flocks..."

God has chosen money as the acid test of our faith and our faithfulness. Why? Maybe it's because we spend all our lives around money – trying to get it, make it, save it, spend it, invest it, and use it. Many of our problems revolve around the misuse of our money, and so many of our heartaches come from overextension of debt.

Confessions of a School Crossing Guard

Melody has been a school crossing guard for 29 years and she has a confession to make. Drivers have been doing it all wrong.

She loves her job and she is good at it. She has made sure students have crossed safely through a busy intersection for many years. In fact, there is no way to know how many children Melody has kept safe to and from school.

But she wants us to know something that many of us don't. Drivers can be issued a ticket for not following the directions of a school crossing guard. Not only do children and parents need to know they should always cross the street at a school crossing, a marked crosswalk or cross with a crossing guard, but motorists should also know the law regarding school crossings.

With thousands of children returning to class in East Texas this week, TxDOT reminds you to stay alert near school zones and buses. We also want to make you aware of the law at school crossings.

According to the Texas Transportation Code, Section 542.501:

A person may not willfully fail or refuse to comply with a lawful order or direction of: (1) a police officer;

(2) a school crossing guard who:

(A) is performing crossing guard duties in a school crosswalk to stop and yield to a pedestrian; or

(B) has been trained under Section 600.004 and is directing traffic in a school crossing zone.

Most drivers don't like slowing down when they enter a school zone or having to wait at a school crossing, but Melody and other crossing guards are trained to help keep students safe even though many drivers feel inconvenienced when required to stop.

Crossing guards have pretty much seen it all. From fights at crosswalks to parents being rude to even teachers not obeying the law. But Melody says her biggest challenges are not the students who can be unruly, overly energetic, or mouthy. It's the motorists who don't want to obey the law.

"As soon as they see me turn to go back to the sidewalk, they start driving behind me before we ever get off the road," she said. "Legally, they are supposed to wait until we are completely off the road before they start driving."

She wants us to be aware of the problem because of all the things that could happen, the thought of a child being hurt on a road she is crossing would be her worst nightmare. And as a parent, that thought is also scary for you.

There are some rules that TxDOT shouldn't have to remind drivers of, but as school bells ring for a new year, some of us need to hear them again.

- Stay alert.
- Watch for children who might run between vehicles.
- Be mindful of children at bus stops.
- Put away your cellphone.
- Slow down.
- Obey school zone speed limit signs and all traffic rules.
- Drive safely around school buses.
- Drop off and pick up children in designated areas.
- Obey all school crossing guards and remain stopped until they have exited the roadway.

Of course, drivers have another incentive for obeying the law and these rules. It gets expensive when you don't. Whether you are speeding, talking on your phone, or not remaining stopped at school crossings, the fine can be up to \$200 per violation.

Not to mention the life of a child is priceless and getting in a hurry or being an impatient driver is not acceptable near buses, school crossings or school zones. Children are less cautious and more vulnerable than adults. Melody already knows that.

And now you know her career confessions – that keeping your child safe is her number one goal each day. But when we as drivers make that hard for her to do, law enforcement will show you no mercy, and neither will she. Obey the school crossing guards. Because the life of a child is worth it.



It was customary when briefing a military audience to give the BLUF— Bottom Line Up Front. Since the target audience of The Refuge devotionals are soldiers in the Lord's army, here's the BLUF: Christians do not have much time in this life to love, to love Christ and to love our neighbor as ourselves. Our earthly existence is short. Tomorrow is not promised to us. We cannot save

Motorcycle Cannonball in Nacogdoches

On Thursday, September 23rd over 100 motorcycle enthusiasts on 90-yearold bikes will stop in Nacogdoches for an overnight stay.

The motorcyclists are a part of the "Motorcycle Cannonball," a 4,300-mile endurance run from Sault Sainte Marie, Michigan to South Padre Island, Texas. They've chosen Nacogdoches, TX as stop #13 on their route.



A Little Bit of History... Happy Birthday, **Ardie Dixon!**

Born in Lufkin, Texas to Hershel and Kathleen (Hinson) Dixon, Dickie Dixon is a sixth generation with very strong roots in other parts of East Texas, too. On his father's side, his ancestors, the Fenleys, arrived in what is now Angelina County, and he died about a year later in what is called the Cordova Rebellion, an event whereby Dickie's great-greatgreat grandmother gained an interest in the Old Stone Fort (or House). None of his family lines arrived in Angelina County later than the 1880s, and one of them, Stanislaw John Pauszek (later anglicized to Poskey) was a Polish immigrant.

Later in life, he studied history at SFASU, serving as a graduate assistant and grader to Dr. Archie P. McDonald, and he has spoken a few times at the



Being very curious, he is interested in all types of history, and I hope I can whet your appetite for history in the future.

On September 1, 1939, Germany invaded Poland in what has come to be known as the September Campaign to begin World War II. In Lufkin, twelve days later—on September 13th—my mother, Kathleen Dixon was besieged on two fronts—one by childbirth and the other by the delivering doctor, but she prevailed over both of them.

Our story takes place at 613 Finley Street behind Sherwin-Williams in Lufkin, and this story was conveyed directly to me from her. (Mother agreed wholeheartedly with the approach Sargeant Friday subscribed to on Dragnet: "Just the facts Ma'am." (She didn't embellish them.)

The scene was in the front bedroom of their two bedroom house, where Dr. Childers was answering a house call. What my mother did to elicit his remarks I will never know, but while Mother was in labor, he said to her: "Oh, you women don't know how to have babies!" Now I don't know about you, but I am amazed a man would ever make a comment like that to a woman, much less to one under the duress of labor. (Especially since she was giving birth to her second child!) Maybe he was having a bad day, or maybe he didn't want to be there that day for a house call. Maybe he cut classes when they lectured on good bedside manner. Or maybe he failed the quiz, or maybe he was just an insensitive male. All I know is he ruffled my mother's feathers, and she shot back with: "Well what do you know about it?"

That day Mother successfully gave birth to one of my older brothers: Ardie Dell Dixon, a 10 pound baby boy, named for the two brothers of Josie Blanche Poskey Dixon.

And we remember all of this today to say: Happy Birthday Ardie!



4Tbsp butter

2 boneless skinless chicken breasts, cut into small bite-size pieces

1/4 tsp salt

1/2 tsp garlic powder

1/4 tsp ground black pepper

1 can cream of chicken soup 1 can cream of mushroom soup 1 can mixed vegetables (drained)

2 (1 top and 1 bottom) unbaked 9 inch deep dish pie crusts

Make sure there is an oven rack on the bottom rack of the oven. Preheat oven to 425 degrees F. Add the butter to a large skillet over medium heat. Once the butter is melted, add the chicken, salt, garlic powder and pepper. Cook for 8-10 minutes, until the chicken is cooked through, stirring often. Add cream of mushroom and cream od chicken soup. Stir well, until combined. Stir in the drained mixed vegetables. Cook until bubbling, stirring often, 3-4 minutes. Remove from the heat and let cool for 10 minutes. Spoon the filling into the pie crust. Top with the second pie crust. Seal the edges of the pie crust together. Cut 3-4 slits in the top crust to allow steam to escape. Place the filled pie plate on a baking sheet. Bake for 30 minutes on the bottom rack of the oven. Cool



Due to the COVID-19 Pandemic, the 36th Annual Texas State Forest Festival was re-branded as the Fall Forest Festival on First Street held in November 2020. In 2021, the Texas State Forest Festival is back and better than ever, happening September 16-19, 2021.

The Texas State Forest Festival hosts several competitions, which includes: the East Texas Cheerleading Championships, the Southern Hushpuppy Championships, the East Texas Pom-Pon/Dance Team Competition, the Miss Forest Festival and Little Mr. Timberjack Pageant, the Pineywoods Class Car Show, and introducing in 2021 is the Big Axe BBQ Competition.

Currently, the Texas State Forest Festival draws crowds approaching 14,000 and generates a net profit of \$50,000 per year – a tremendous accomplishment for an event 35 years old! Annually, the Texas State Forest Festival requires over 150 volunteers working about 2,500 hours to stage the event, and continues to be one of the premier annual events in East Texas!

When Angelina County native Casey Adams was 10 years old, he recalled a memory of his aunt being late to pick him up to attend the Forest Festival that year.

"I just remember that date because I was literally pacing back and forth in the yard," he said.

Now he looks forward to taking his three kids and creating memories that last a lifetime. Plus, he said he is looking forward to eating a fried Oreo and any type of meat-on-the-stick.

"Each time I take my kids, it's more fun each time," Adams said.

Colleen Murray, who will be working the event for the first time, is looking forward to finding a fried Twinkie to dine on. She had her first one in September 2011 at the Forest Festival and said it's time for another. Plus, she is excited to work the festival and see the behind-the-scenes magic.

"Even though it's going to be a lot of hard work, it's going to be a lot of fun at the same time," she said. She also said she wanted to remind festival-goers that there will be plenty of delicious festival food and drinks to enjoy.

Amanda Crocker, the Chamber's director of membership, remembers the family tradition of going to the carnival with her papaw every year.

"My papaw used to take my sister and I to the carnival when we were little every single year. So it's a family tradition," she said. "So, I am carrying on that tradition with my two girls."

Tara Watson-Watkins, president/CEO of the Lufkin/Angelina County Chamber of Commerce, has been attending the Forest Festival since she was a young girl. She said she was "always excited to go around the loop and see the Ferris wheel light up at night."

This year, she is excited about the new attractions and the annual competitions. But really, she is excited to be able to see the 37the annual Texas State Forest Festival occur for friends and family to make new traditions and forever memories.

"It's a longstanding tradition that people from East Texas like to come and enjoy with their family," Watson-Watkins said. "It's 37 years old, and it continues to be relevant in our community. It's the history of what Lufkin/Angelina County was founded on — the forestry. It's a great time for families to enjoy and be outside and eat great carnival food, and make lots of memories to last a lifetime."

Walter Burns - Special Ops

As told to Terri Lacherby Walter Burns



Walter Burns was born in Conroe, Texas, in 1945. He has two children, four grandchildren, and ten greatgrandchildren. He was married to his first wife Nelda from 1964 until her death in Jan. 2010. He remarried in Sept, 2010 to Molly Burns and now resides with her in Nacogdoches, Texas.


Walter's early years were spent in southwest Louisiana where his father worked in the oilfields. When he was about 12 years old he moved to Houston with his mother. At the age of 13, his mother passed away and he was left standing on the street corner holding his 9 month old nephew, as the ambulance drove away with his mother followed by his sister and her husband in their car. From that point forward, he bounced around between his father's home in Louisiana, his older sister's home in Houston, and various friends homes.

Being a largely-unguided teen boy, Walter ended up in late 1963 with a heft-

ty collection of unpaid traffic tickets, and was cordially invited by the local judge to either volunteer to join the service or spend some time in jail for the unpaid tickets.

"I chose enlistment, with the judge authorizing my under-aged enlistment at the age of 17," Walter said, "I was a lost, aimless boy when I joined the army. The army did a good job of raising me into the man I am today."

Walter's army service began with basic and advanced infantry training in Fort Polk, Louisiana. From there he went to Fort Rucker, Alabama, for Rotary Wing Mechanic training. Once that was completed, he shipped out to Germany. Being a definite southern boy used to plenty of hot weather, he felt like Germany was worse than a prison sentence, with the cold and monotony. His job there was working on Bell OH-13 helicopters, which were little 2-seat observation helicopters. The airfield at Darmstadt was very small and quiet. Pilots and other personnel were just "doing time," and for a young, energetic enlisted man, Walter found little relief from the boredom. His captain, who was a pilot, would have Walter join in on boredom-busting "training" flights in the Bell helicopters, where they would do auto rotation

landings, which were climbing straight up to about 1200 feet and then free-falling until close to the ground, when they pulled a pitch on the helicopter blades to slow the descent enough to have a safe landing.

"It was like riding a roller coaster all day long, and got pretty boring after the first few rides," Walter said, chuckling as he recalled another incident while in Germany. He and a fellow enlisted man found a small, old motorcycle in the trash. They pulled it out and revived it, but it had no tires. Still, they spent time riding it up and down on the runway on the bare metal wheels, sparks flying. He's still amazed that they survived their antics!

Walter learned of an option to re-enlist, which would extend his service time by one year, but would also offer him a reenlistment bonus and, most importantly, it meant he would be transferred stateside for additional training. It sounded like a great way to leave Germany, so he took the re-enlistment, transferring to Fort Eustice, Virginia for mechanic training on H-21 helicopters, which, interestingly enough, were being phased out of the military. He completed the training and was sent to Fort Ord in California where he was to be based. He spent some time repairing helicopter blades in an area manned almost exclusively with civilians.

Again, he found his job tedious. He couldn't leave the base on evenings and weekends. When he was at the movies one weekend,

he and a fellow enlisted man noticed a poster for Special Forces training. It sounded like a great opportunity to find something more exciting for a young man nearing 20 years of age. So, Walter and his friend both signed up, much to the irritation of his 1st Sergeant, who had been refusing to allow transfer requests for the daring duo. Orders came through within a few days for the Special Forces training at Fort Bragg, North Carolina, for both Walter and his friend. While en route to Fort Bragg, Walter took his leave time to drive home to Houston in his 1954 Mercury. It had no thermostat and froze up. In Flagstaff Arizona, with no heat, he drove wrapped up in blankets. The radiator also froze up because there was no antifreeze in it. A gas station owner let him park his car inside the garage until the radiator defrosted enough to add antifreeze.


"It was a great lesson in supply and demand, as the gas station had the only supply, and I desperately needed it. So I paid \$25 for one gallon of

antifreeze, instead of the going price of about \$4," Walter laughed.

He reported for duty at the 7th Special Forces Group training at Fort Bragg. The training included medic training, guerrilla warfare, escape and evasion. His specialty was guerrilla warfare, which he found much more to his liking than repairing helicopter blades. He went home to Houston to marry his first wife in August of 1964, having met and courted her when he had taken leaves over the past.

In March of 1965, which was the time of civil unrest in the south due to desegregation protests, Walter took a trip back to Houston to pick up his wife and return to North Carolina with her. They ended up going through Selma, Alabama during the civil unrest over Martin Luther King's march and the segregation issues. They were stopped before entering Selma, where a police officer told them to lock their doors, drive straight through, and to not stop for anything. His new wife was terrified, and perhaps wondering what she had gotten into. Fortunately, they were able to get through without problems, and made it back to Fort Bragg.

Walter had barely settled in to married life when he received orders to ship out to Vietnam in July of 1965 as part of the initial troop build-up, attached

to the 1st Cav Division, 228th Helicopter Batallion. He left out of Mayport, Florida in August on the USS Boxer. The journey took about a month, having navigated through a large hurricane with the USS Boxer aircraft carrier loaded to maximum capacity with aircraft packed in like sardines in a can, and everything else needed

to establish a large presence in Vietnam. The aircraft carrier was riding so low in the water that it dragged the bottom of the Suez Canal. It required every piece of mechanical equipment available, including military tanks, as well as quite a few mules, to pull the heavy aircraft carrier through the

When he arrived at Qui'non, Vietnam to establish a base about 40 miles inland at Ankhe, (which would later become Camp Radcliff), they

literally had to clear out trees for enough room to land a helicopter, as they were about the first Americans in the area. Chainsaws were few and far between, and most of the ground was cleared by hacking away with machetes.

There were the a lot of difficult and painful memories relating to Walter's time in Vietnam, there

were also some times that cause him to chuckle a bit.

Since getting fresh food to the troops in Vietnam was challenging, most of the meals were from rations, where everything came out of a can. Walter was on a helicopter flight returning from Saigon with his major, when he spotted a water buffalo alone in a rice paddy. He pointed it out to the major, who asked if he could skin it. They ended up shooting the water buffalo, hooked it up under the helicopter, and flew it into camp.

Walter said, "Once there, it was skinned and cut up, and the base ate well for quite a few days. Fresh steak dinners and lots of stew sure beat the canned rations!"

There was another time, early on, when the camp in Vietnam still had no power. The major heard there were generators at the port of Qui'non, but none of them were set aside for their company. So, the major loaded up Walter with paint and a stencil and flew to Qui'non. The major dropped Walter out by the generators, then flew over and landed by the guard and made small conversation with him. Walter covertly added the company

address onto a generator crate and slipped around behind the guard and headed back to the helicopter, with the guard none the wiser. Within a few days, their company had a nice big generator and plenty of power.

Being Special Forces TDY to the 1st CAV with dual specialties of guerrilla warfare and loadmaster on Chinook helicopters with the 228th helicopter battalion kept Walter quite busy. Under the command of Col. Bruce Crandall and in the first part of Nov. 1965, they were engaged in the battle of Ple Mi, when the North Vietnamese tried to overrun the Special Forces camp. Walter did not realize that it would be just a warm up for what would become the largest battle of his military career. By the middle of Nov. 65 they were engaged in the battle of La Drang Valley for a week, flying support for the infantry supplying ammunition and supplies as well as moving troops and equipment, 105 howitzers, mortars, etc.

"Little did I know that during that battle that my wife had given birth to my daughter back in San Augustine, Texas, where she had returned to be close to her parents during my deployment. I was notified of her birth by the Red Cross in Jan of 1966, six weeks after she was born," Walter said.

Throughout Walter's deployment he was either working with the Montiguard Indians of the central highlands or on the Chinooks, supporting the ground troops in their skirmishes or battles, never giving him the opportunity to take R&R.

"There are many stories that go along with my time in Vietnam, we survived 2 helicopter (Chinook) crashes, one down in the heavy jungle which we had to burn; the other close call was an auto rotation landing at 4 in the morning with no lights, just happened to sit it down on the crest of an 80 ft deep gully, after rolling over about 3 times and landing upside down," Walter said. "The most serious injury was that the crew chief got a broken leg."

They secured the damaged helicopter, unloaded and engines removed, and then airlifted it back

to base. Because of limited space in the transport helicopter, Walter rode the entire way back to the camp hanging onto the lift cable, perched on top of the wrecked helicopter.

Walter was honorably discharged from the Army in 1967. He found adjusting to civilian life challenging, and bounced around to many different jobs, including mechanic jobs, operating his own service station, and as a salesman for nuts and bolts. He became a salesman for floor refinishing supplies and found that people who could apply the finishes to gymnasium floors were in short supply. He then started doing the gym floor refinishing business for himself, working for schools, primarily in Texas and Louisiana. This proved profitable, and became his primary career until he retired in 2005 from heart issues related to Agent Orange poisoning,

Walter Burns now spends his time puttering around in the tool shed, planning fishing days, and trying to enjoy the quieter life on his property, tucked among the piney woods outside of Nacogdoches.

"I was extremely blessed by GOD that thru out my tour I only received minor injuries," Walter said. "I was stabbed by a Vietnamese that did not want to exit the chopper with his recon team. The other time we were on high alert and I was sleeping in the chopper when the Viet Cong ran elephants thru the perimeter and hit the flight line with satchel charges. I caught some shrapnel from that."

"In closing I would like to say that in addition to God bringing me thru these years in my life, I am very grateful to the Honorable Judge that gave me the opportunity to join the Army, and lastly to the U.S. Army that literally raised me and made me the man I turned out to be," Walter said.

To be a good police officer in today's world takes a lot of commitment and a lot of prayer. Chief Jim Sevey has a lot of both.

Originally from West Texas, Chief Sevey says he considers Midland his home town. He graduated from Midland High School (go Dawgs), and earned his Associates Degree in Criminal Justice. He then went to Lubbock Christian University for an undergraduate degree in



Management. From there he attended the University of Texas earning his Master's in Criminal Justice Administration. Chief Sevey also attended and graduated from the FBI National Academy and the Senior Management Institute for Police.

Most of Chief Sevey's experience was with the Midland Police Department. He spent twenty-five years, working in various divisions before coming to Nacogdoches in 2005, taking the position as police chief. He has worked with both operational and command levels. Chief Sevey, and his wife, Sherry, have four children, Jeremy, Blaine, Ashley, and Matt. They also have three grandchildren, Addy, Luke and Henry.

"We also have a German shepherd, Hans Gruber and two cats, Mildred and John Walter," Chief Sevey said.

When Chief Sevey is not serving the community as a police officer, he loves woodworking, a hobby he has had since he was "very young." He loves to build things with his hands, and says he has things he made for his mother that are over forty years old. He and his wife, Sherry, have a business called Hill Country Woodworks of Texas. He enjoys making custom Shaker influenced furniture.



Betty Shinn is no stranger to the Nacogdoches community. Born in Smith County, Texas, Betty, the daughter of Willie Lee and Ruby Gilley, married her high school sweetheart, Ernest Shinn.

They had two children, Lee Paul, and Jane Ann, and they have two granddaughters, Kelley Jane and Ashley Ann. They moved to Nacogdoches in the fall of 1974. Betty began working at Nacog-

doches Memorial Hospital and in 1975 she became a charter member of the staff at Nacogdoches Medical Center Hospital. Her husband, Ernest, retired from the Texas Department of Human Resources.

While working at Medical Center, Betty managed the Image Center as the Director of Medical Imaging. She was also the Marketing Director for Community Development. During her working career, she served as the Annual Meeting Planner for The Texas Society of Radiologic Technologists for about fifteen years, and was also the editor of their professional journal, TEX-RAYS. She has also chaired other annual events for various organizations.

Her years of service as a volunteer included serving as the chair for thirty years in the Nacogdoches Heritage Festival. Betty also has served as president of Nacogdoches Heritage Heralds, and the co-chairman of the Nacogdoches Historical Foundation, which overseas the Zion Hill Church revocation project along with the City of Nacogdoches and the Bright Foundation. Betty is also a member of the board of the Friends of Historic Nacogdoches, Inc. which is instrumental in the placement and building of the historic statues around town.

During her working career, Betty helped Dr. Ernest Seitz from Lufkin, to establish the radiology program at Angelina College. She also served as the state president and editor of their State Journal. During her service at Medical Center, she was privileged to work with Dr. Loma Laird and Dr. Bill Jones, and many others.

"I have enjoyed being a volunteer in this community in many other areas that I have not listed, but the rewards have been great. It gives me personal satisfaction that I have helped many along the way, professionally, personally, and with my faith. I enjoy seeing the smiles on the faces, and knowing that I may have been a small part in their lives is rewarding enough," Betty said.

If a person did a little digging, they would soon discover that there are very few organizations that Betty Shinn has not been involved in, dedicating her time and energy as a volunteer, and serving where needed. She has continued to bring sunshine into the lives of the Nacogdoches Community for over forty-seven years, and is a familiar face about town. If there is a need, Betty is probably not far behind, organizing, planning, and serving others.

Betty said, "I would offer this advice to young ladies and young mothers. Offer whatever time and advice to the younger generation, and always make time for what is necessary. There is always time in the day to help others."

Betty, and husband, Ernest are enjoying their retirement. They have been active members at First Christian Church for about eighteen years, where Ernest is an elder, and teaches a Bible study for men, and a mixed Sunday school Life Class, and Betty is a deaconess.

Where Have Shoeshine Stands Gone?

Neal Murphy grew up in the small town of San Augustine, Texas. He and wife Clara have two grown children. Moving back after retiring, now with five grandchildren and four great-grandchildren, he began, as a hobby, writing short stories of humorous things that he observed over the years. He was an ambulance driver in college, worked for two funeral homes, then spent over forty years in the insurance business. He also writes stories of his forty-four years as a state certified police officer working for seven different departments. After living in five different states, he is now retired back in San Augustine and has his stories printed in



seven different newspapers, and published five books. He is a graduate of Stephen F. Austin University, and the Insurance Institute of America. He is a Deacon in a Baptist Church and former Sunday School Teacher for many years, as well as Choir Director at several churches. He is also the docent in the 1919 Jail Museum in San Augustine and works three days a week. He was the director of the restoration og the old county records dating back to the 1800s.

When I was a kid growing up in the small town of San Augustine, Texas in the 1940s and 1950s, I recall our town having at least two shoeshine stands. They were located inside two barbershops in the downtown area. Mr. Stephenson owned a shoe repair shop where he worked with all kinds of leather goods including saddles and harnesses. He would also put a shine on shoes that he had repaired with new leather soles. Mr. Crawford had a shoe repair shop on the east side of the courthouse.

A classmate of mine, Raymon Earl Hilton, had a shoeshine stand in the barbershop on the north side of the square. He put a shine on my leather shoes several times while I was waiting to get my hair cut. I look around town today and there are no more shoeshine stands to be seen anywhere. What has happened to them?

I think we can blame the "tennis shoe" for their demise. Around 1955 the new style shoe was introduced. This shoe was not made of leather, but of cloth, with rubber soles. They did not need to be shined. So, fewer and fewer shoes are now made of leather, therefore there is no need for a shoeshine boy.

Prior to 1950 in England, some shoes were manufactured with rubber soles and heels. They were primarily worn by guards in prisons. The guards could walk silently throughout the prisons. The inmates thus called them "sneakers" because the guards could sneak up on them silently. So, the word "sneaker" has stuck over time to the tennis shoe type of footwear.

Back to the shoeshine stands. After some research on the matter, it would appear that in our modern time most shoeshine stands are located in airport terminals. There are about 50 of them left. Most of their clientele are male travelers who wear boots or dress shoes. A few women who wear boots make use of the shoeshine boys.

Out of necessity, most shoeshine boys have learned to clean up and brighten the white soles on sneakers, thus they have developed new clientele in this area. Back in the early days of air travel, fliers dressed up to fly. Men wore business suits with shined shoes, and women dressed up as though going to a wedding or shower. If one notices air travelers of today, they are dressed down to shorts, tee shirts and flip flops. Women wear shorts and sandals, sometimes wearing clothes resembling their pajamas.

At the Louis Armstrong New Orleans International Airport, there are two "Like New Shoe Stands" that have been owned and run by Wayne Kendrick's family for about forty years. Kendrick, who began helping his dad at the airport thirty-three years ago, now operates the stands with his brother. He charges \$7 for a shoe shine, up from the \$5 his dad charged years ago.

Time-crushed business travelers are helping to keep most airport shoeshine stands in business now days. In many airports it's a long-held tradition of fast, friendly, inexpensive and complimentary services that keeps customers coming back. At the Chicago O'Hare International Airport, the "Shoe Hospital" stand not only shines shoes (\$6) and boots (\$8), it also offers repair services for shoes, luggage, purses, bags, jackets, and other leather items, such as shoe laces, supports, shoe cushions, mostly to pilots and flight attendants.

Apparently shining shoes is a dying art. Other than those seen at airports and bus terminals, I never see a shoeshine stand any more. Most of my shoes are made of something other than leather, thus a shine is from a damp cloth. So, if I can live without a shoeshine boy's service, so can millions of other men. Ain't that a shame.


MONUMENT CORNER

This month we are back in San Augustine County in the city of San Augustine. A couple blocks south and east of downtown we find the St. Augustine Catholic Church. Its marker reads as follows:

ST. AUGUSTINE CATHOLIC CHURCH

IN 1716 FRANCISCAN MISSIONARIES HELD THE FIRST CATHOLIC SERVICES IN THIS VICINITY. FOR MANY YEARS CATHOLICS IN SAN AUGUSTINE WERE WITHOUT LEADERSHIP UNTIL 1847 WHEN THE DIOCESE OF GALVESTON RECOGNIZED IT AS A MISSION AND SENT THE REV. L. C. M. CHAMBODUT AS PASTOR. IN 1880 M. C. TYNAN DEEDED THE LOT AT THIS SITE FOR A CHURCH WHICH WAS COMPLETED THE NEXT YEAR. A NEW STRUCTURE REPLACED THAT BUILDING IN 1937 AND WAS LATER CALLED ST. JAMES. IN 1975 THE DIOCESE OF BEAUMONT RENAMED THE CHURCH ST. AUGUSTINE.




