IMPACT Gearing Up to Serve More Than 200 Kids at Christmas

Since 2010 IMPACT, a nonprofit organization run completely by a volunteer staff, has been providing Christmas gifts for children in foster care and children placed with family members other than parents. Working closely with Child Protective Services in Nacogdoches, Shelby and San Augustine Counties, these children receive a gift bag custom packed for them, based on their Wish List. At a party on the Tuesday before Christmas, the kids and the families are served a meal and Santa comes to deliver their gifts. The location for the party is donated by Southern Bliss, an event location on Highway 59 South in Nacogdoches. The food is donated by: Cotton Patch, Chick-Fil-A and Taco Bueno. All of the gifts are donated by local families who have selected a Wish List from the trees placed by IMPACT at Cotton Patch, Chili's Sparkle Boutique and the IMPACT store at 801 East Main Street.

Beginning in October, Julia Jones, founder and full-time volunteer, sends the blank Wish List forms to CPS for the caseworkers to gather the information regarding the needs and wishes of each child. These forms are returned to IMPACT where the Wish List cards are filled out, the information is filed in a Holiday notebook and the cards are hung on Christmas trees at the locations which help each year. Local businesses and social groups also adopt a number of Wish List cards and fill those Wishes for each child.

Each year, IMPACT gifts over 200 children who many not have a Merry Christmas without this event. The bags are filled with IMPACT - Page 2

sicianship across an array of different styles of honky-tonk music. He wrote each song on the album and played every instrument in authentic honky-tonk fashion, proving he knows his stuff when it comes to traditional country music, and earning the title of "King of Texas Twang."

A native of Brownsboro, Texas, he first became interested in country music as a child when he saw a commercial for a Hank Williams record album on television.

Jake attracted national attention as a featured guest on RFD-TV's TruCountry, and was a regular cast member on RuralTV's Texas Pickin' Party where he not only sang, but was also the program's pedal steel guitarist. He has performed as country music icon Hank Williams, Sr. in the Off Broadway play Lost Highway and in his self-penned road show, Hank Williams Remembered. He hosted the 2nd longest-running show in America, WSM's Ernest Tubb Midnite Jamboree, on September 19, 2015

He is a country music traditionalist who believes moving forward doesn't necessarily mean leaving the past behind. "There were a lot of great ones before me," he says. "There's still a lot you can do with what they started. These new guys, they're creating something new and different, and that's great, but we can't forget where we came from. If country music is going to carry on, you have to keep the roots alive." Jake identifies with fellow Texas Honky-Tonker, Dale Watson, and has embraced the Ameripolitan genre as his own. Jake was nominated in 2015 for "Honky Tonk Male Artist of the Year" for the second annual Ameripolitan Music Awards (ameripolitan.com) in Austin, TX. He was recently named Pure Country Vocalist of the Year by the Academy of Western Artists.

At an imperially slim 6-feet-two-inches, decked out in a suit and tie, and crowned with his signature Stetson, Jake Penrod even looks like a flashback to country music's heyday. He gives credit to fellow Texan Ernest Tubb for inspiring his style. "He always looked like a million bucks. His band, too." Jake was recently featured on a story by CBS News about the Texas ae, this is where it will carry on."

Jake Penrod and his Million Dollar Cowboys can be seen regularly in the dance halls and honky-tonks throughout Texas. His hardcore honky tonk band and powerful, Ray Price-like tenor vocals pierce through the loudest of barrooms and keep dancers on their feet all night. "There's not a lot of downtime in our shows," he says. "These people show up to dance."





We would load the pickup, drive over treacherous dirt roads, through a couple of hard to open barbwire gates, down a dry wash that required getting out to turn the hubs on each wheel to make it "four wheel drive", and finally come over a slight rise and there would be a small body of green, still water surrounded by reeds. It was an oasis in the middle of the desert.


The kids all jumped out of the bed of the pickup while my parents warned of snakes, quicksand, and a thousand other scenarios for immediate death. They weren't wrong. As we ran to get our spot, water moccasins, green water snakes, and a rattlesnake or two ed loudly about it.

Fish were easy to catch. These fish had never even seen a hook. They were not the cynical bass of today with scars from being caught too many times. With worms dug from the yard, the fish feasted on our hooks. We didn't grow tired of fishing; we just got worn out from pulling them in all day.

Back home, nailed to a tree, we stripped the catfish with pliers, washed them off with a hose, and threw them wrapped in cornmeal straight into an Iron Dutch Oven bubbling with lard over a mesquite wood fire. I have never since had such a fine and pure dining experience, probably never will.



"What We Have Here Is a Communication Problem"

A woman dialed the number of what she thought was the local record shop. A man answered. She asked, "Do you have 'Ten Little Fingers and Ten Little Toes in Alabama'?" The man had no idea that she was talking about a song. He said, "No, but I do have a wife and fifteen kids in Louisiana." She asked, "Is that a record?" He said, "I don't know if it is a record or not, but it sure is above average."

Communication — everybody's discussing it, studying it, practicing it. Yet, despite our improved communication skills, we may

feel like the author who wrote, "I know that you believe you understand what you think I said, but I am not sure you realize that what you heard is not what I meant."

Good communication involves more than good speaking; it also requires good listening. Jesus, the master communicator, was often misunderstood. Although He spoke the truth clearly, His hearers jumbled up His message and then rejected it. "Why do you not understand My speech?" He quizzed them. Answering His own question, He replied, "Because you are not able to listen to My word" (John 8:43). Why were they such poor listeners? Not because Jesus failed to communicate, but because they didn't want to hear the truth. And why didn't they? Because it made them face up to their need to change.

We have never really listened to Christ's words. We have never really taken His word and trusted that His way is the way to truth and to life. Even today His voice is a still, small voice amid the noise of our time. But to those who will trust, Christ still speaks — words of counsel, words of forgiveness, words of hope. But only to those who listen.

When we say, "God is getting through to me," it's not because He's communicating better but because we're hearing and willing to change. Let's always make listening to God one of our best communication skills.



Halloween Tips to Keep It Fun by Jason Bridges

The Nacogdoches County Sheriff Office would like to offer a few tips for Halloween. Everyone loves a good scare on Halloween, but not when it comes to child safety. There are several easy and effective behaviors that parents can share with kids to help reduce the risk of injury.

Facts:

On average, children are more than twice as likely to be hit by a car on Halloween than any other day of the year.

Top Tips:

Decorate costumes and bags with reflective tape or stickers and, if possible, choose light colors. Since masks can sometimes obstruct a child's vision, try non-toxic face paint and makeup whenever possible.

Have kids use glow sticks or flashlights to help them see and be seen by drivers.

Children under the age of 12 should not be alone at night without adult supervision. If kids are mature enough to be out without supervision, remind them to stick to familiar areas that are well lit and trick-or-treat in groups.

Popular trick-or-treating hours are 5:30 p.m. to 9:30 p.m., so be especially alert for kids during those hours.

When selecting a costume make sure it is the right size to prevent trips and falls.

Drivers can pose the biggest threat to children on Halloween night. Drivers need to pay attention and slow down, especially in neighborhoods. The big thing is just get (children) to slow down, walk everywhere and be alert. Put the electronic devices down. We don't want to be distracted or staring at a phone.

A concern for many parents on Halloween night is predators lurking around when children are trick-or-treating. Parents need to check sex offender registries to know who to look out for and which houses to avoid.

Even though parents should be aware, registered sex offenders have rules they have to abide by on Halloween. They cannot participate in Halloween trick-ortreating. If they're going to be at home they have to have their porch light off. The Sheriff Office will be out in full force checking on sex offenders to make sure they are in compliance.

Trying to document historical facts and memories that East Texans have of these Pineywoods is an impossible task. There is not enough ink to print all of the accomplishments of the strong men and women who worked to make their dreams come true.

Milestones and achievements come and go, but I think it is important to stop, reflect and recognize a few from time to time. The Texas Department of Transportation will mark its 100th birthday next year. Plans are already well under way, and I know you will hear much more about the events of the coming year as they unfold.

The Lufkin District will be a big part of that celebration. The district was founded in the early 1930's and the stories and photographs I have heard and seen of those early years are very exciting.

It is rumored the district still uses the old oak desk first used by Lufkin District Engineer Luther DeBerry in the 1950s. He went on to become a State Transportation Engineer in 1973 and was inducted into the Texas Transportation Hall of Honor at the Texas Transportation Institute of A&M in 2003. The Lufkin Area Office is still located in the original two-story brick building on the back part of the Lufkin District campus. The beautiful staircase, oak flooring and woodwork are testaments to the degree of talent that abounded in East Texas when it was constructed.

As roads such as FM 1 and the East Texas Highway were cut through dense forests, we grew as an agency and so did East Texas. Modern roadways and bridges were constructed that connected communities and towns. Young throughout the state.

businesses like Southern Pine Lumber Company in Diboll; Martin Wagon Company, Southland Paper Mill and Angelina County Lumber Company in Lufkin; McKinney Drilling, Stephen F. Austin State University and the Stone Fort National Bank in Nacogdoches all began to breathe with life and helped grow surrounding areas. Many successful businesses depended on TxDOT to build the best and many today still do.



Old Stagecoach Road as it was cut through the pineywoods of East Texas near Marshall. The old road crossed the state line at Shreveport in the 1800s before modern roadways were built. There have reportedly been may ghosts sightings on this old road.

Nacogdoches, the oldest town in Texas, will celebrate its 300th birthday next year and Lufkin recently celebrated its 134th. 3/4 cup red wine vinegar


1 teaspoon prepared mustard

1/4 teaspoon pepper


Preparation:


