





It already comes "built in." It is an intrinsic part of you. I have long believed that Texans, through their hard-earned









## News from the Nacogdoches County Attorney's Office

#### Across Texas, No Jury Trials Create Backlog of Criminal Cases

Like many, our office is excited to usher in a new year. While 2020 has been unforgettable, we wouldn't mind forgetting some of it. It will be hard to forget, however, given the backlog of cases that waits on the other side of the pandemic.

One of the challenges that the criminal justice system will face in 2021 and beyond is the backlog

of cases created by the pandemic. Across the country, many cases that would normally be heard, pled or tried have been delayed. The cases have been delayed due to concerns about spreading the coronavirus. In most States, if not all, orders from a variety of governing bodies have restricted or banned in-person court proceedings. In Texas, for instance, the Supreme Court of Texas issued its Twenty-Ninth Emergency Order Regarding the COVID-19 State of Disaster on November 11, 2020, stating in part: "Courts must not conduct in-person proceedings contrary to the Guidance for All Court Proceedings During COVID-19 Pandemic issued by the Office of Court Administration." Judges are not permitted to hold in-person proceedings in any matter, much less a jury trial, unless the trial judge has used all reasonable efforts to conduct the proceeding remotely (videoconferencing). In order to have a jury trial, a court must obtain prior approval for that jury proceeding from the local administrative district judge and Regional Presiding Judge.

A jury trial is considered to be a bedrock right within our criminal justice system - the right to have a jury of peers decide if one is guilty or not guilty of a crime. If a criminal defendant requests a jury trial, his right to such must be protected. He can't be made to waive or give up that right. The threat of a jury trial keeps the criminal justice system moving - and without that threat, it creates a backlog. The pandemic removed the threat of a jury trial for all intents and purposes. In counties all across Texas, colleagues share that they have a backlog of cases because the catalyst for resolving cases, a jury trial, is absent from the system.

While there has been an hiatus in jury trials since March, 2020, there will be a reckoning. And that's where the public can help. Once jury trials are permitted, there will be many opportunities to serve on a jury. While some groan at the privilege, the public will be needed more than ever to resolve disputes and deliver verdicts. For those who say they've never been selected for a jury, that may change as I anticipate more jury trials in the first year post pandemic than we've had in the last two to three years combined. A robust effort will need to be made by the criminal justice system to manage the backlog. It will be the public, however, from which juries are chosen, that will play the most vital role in restoring balance within our dockets. Their participation will be required to keep the criminal justice system moving forward — even if at the pace of a pandemic.

Here's to hoping each of you has a blessed 2021.



The 2020 College Football season is in the books and the 2020 winner of the Heisman Trophy, the most prestigious award in college football has been named.

In 1955 Howard "Hopolong" Cassidy of Ohio State was the winner. Dr Jim Swink who was born in Sacul, Texas in 1936 was the Runner-Up. He attended Sacul School thru the 8th grade and transferred to Cushing in 1949 for his Freshman year. He played football, basketball and baseball for the Bearkats. Due to family illness he transferred to Rusk and became a great player for the Rusk Eagles. In 1953 he was chosen the Outstanding Player in the Texas High School Coaches All-Star Basketball Game.

Jim went to Texas Christian University to play football for the Horned Frogs. In 1955 he averaged 123 yards a game and had an 8.2 per carry, a record that still stands. He and the Horned Frogs won Cotton Bowl games in 1955 & '56. In the



May 20, 2002 Dallas Morning News Sports page Frank Luksa, sports writer for the News, described the greatest run he had ever seen, it was a 62 yard run against the University of Texas in 1955. He said, "I never saw Swink run thru the line, but he would appear amid a startled Longhorn secondary and would

fake tacklers off their feet." That day he ran for 235 yards and 4 T D's. Jim was a 2-time All-American and, Academic All-American. He played one year with the Dallas Texans.

In 1955 he was Captain of the team and winner of the National Sportsmanship Award. He was elected to the Texas Sports Hall of Fame in 1977. In 1980

he was elected to the ABC Television Silver Anniversary team. In 1989 he became a Charter member of the NCAA Academic Hall of Fame. He was inducted into the Cotton Bowl Hall of Fame and recipient of the Doak Walker Award in 2005.

Jim was most proud of his academic accomplishments and credited his teachers and coaches at Sacul, Cushing, Rusk and TCU for his success. After retiring from his medical practice in Ft Worth, he and wife Jeannie retired back to Rusk. He passed away in 2014.

His 5 sisters and brother graduated from Cushing. Vera, Rose Mary,



#### Life Under The Juniper Tree

"It is enough! Now, Lord, take my life, for I am no better than my fathers!"
(1 Kings 19:4 NKJV)

Depression is the common cold of our emotions. Eventually it touches everyone. A classic example of a depressed person in the Bible is the prophet Elijah. He became so discouraged at one point in his life that he ran away, sat down under a juniper tree and asked God to let him die. "I've had it, Lord," he said. "Take my life for I am no better than my fathers!" (1 Kings 19:4 NKJV). Elijah was having a pity party.

Elijah's depression wasn't bound up in any one cause. Rather, it stemmed from a number of things. There were at least four causes of his depression as revealed in (1 Kings 19): fear (v. 3), failure (v. 4), fatigue (v. 5), and futility (v. 10).

Fortunately, we don't have to be the helpless victims of our emotions. We can bounce back from depression to live useful lives. Here are four suggestions taken from the experience of Elijah for our consideration in dealing with depression.

**First, Take Time Off.** Elijah took some time off so he could get physically and emotionally rejuvenated. He had been so busy taking care of others he had neglected his own needs. No one can run full throttle all the time. We need to slow down to an idle occasionally.

**Second, Let It All Out.** Elijah talked through his frustrations with God. Talking is one of the best ways to rid ourselves of harmful emotions. When we talk, it is like pulling the plug out of the bathtub. All sorts of bad feelings are drained from us. You can talk to others, but don't forget to talk to God. Say what you want to God, He can take it. God will not condemn you as you pour out your hurts.

**Third, Get Life Back in Perspective.** Depressed people often feel alone. They often focus on the negative. Many times they arrive at the wrong conclusions. Elijah thought he was more important than he really was. He thought everything depended on him. If God's work depends solely on you and me, God is in serious trouble.

**Fourth, Get Back in the Mainstream.** The time for complaints and selfpity came to end. Elijah needed to get back to work. With us, as it was with Elijah, the best way to quit feeling sorry for ourselves is to start feeling sorry for someone else.

Elijah whipped his depression and went on to a lifetime of useful service. So can you.

#### **Cushing in January**







#### A Story of Mercy and Grace -James Arriola


Many might say the fact he's lived 94 years is the reason why he has so many great stories to tell, but James Arriola would beg to differ. Born to a family of ten in Nacogdoches, he appeared during hard times just as the Depression was starting to affect Americans.



Many people know James
Arriolla as a barber, and
rightly so, as he's been
cutting hair for the last 72
years! When asked how
he's been able to manage
all these years, he replied
that it's because of his
skinny legs, referring to the
long hours a barber must
stand. Seeing as how quick
his mind is and agile his
body, you might wonder
if barbering is the secret
to a good, long life. Aside

from a quadruple bypass in 1997 followed by angioplasty the next year, he's very healthy. In fact, he walks every morning in his neighborhood, a practice he began before even leaving the hospital room at Methodist. Besides the successful surgery, he testifies that God has seen him through many a time as bad or worse than that.

He joined the Navy along with a brother in 1944 at age 18 weighing just 117 lbs. Being told his weight was of no consequence, he was assigned to a small amphibious boat as a Navy machine gunner that traveled from ship to shore delivering supplies and marines. For the next 22 months, he was involved in the last two major offenses of WW II. At the landing on Iwo Jima, he lugged two heavy crates of ammunition on shore to a bunker where he was told to promptly "get back to your ship before you get killed!" He witnessed on this occasion



a higher ranking marine grab two others by the scruff of their necks and maneuver them into battle. Upon reaching the top of the bunker, a mortar landed and exploded. His heart sank witnessing the loss of these three men. While in port a couple months later, he saw one of these men walking down the dock and he yelled to him, "Mendoza, Mendoza! I thought you died back on the beach of Iwo Jima?" Come to find out, and at great relief to Arriola, the mortar didn't fully ignite. The three he thought for sure had died only suffered burns to the chest and were transported away from battle and safely to a hospital.

Though he never fired on anyone, he spoke about two times while in the service that God saved him. One being when he slipped and fell about 40 feet from a ship to dock, landing on pipes which surly could have left him dead or paralyzed. Another occasion was when out at sea in the pitch black of night, he slipped and went overboard. Somehow, though, he managed to grab ahold at the last minute being pulled back into the boat by another sailor.



He talks of God having a plan for his life, and that's why he was rescued. He also says, "I was once a Paul, you know in the Bible...the one that was on the road to Damascus not wanting to believe that there was a God, a creator of all things. That changed in 1966. While lying in bed about midnight, he cried out to God, "If you're real, take this pain in my back away!" Immediately from the top of his head down his back he felt a tingling and in a moment, the pain was gone! He said, "OK God, you're real, but I'm not sure about Heaven." In a moment, he was whisked away from his body.

In trying to describe this, Mr. Arriola had a difficult time but said he saw a throne and around the throne were countless people all smiling, wearing white and with white hair. From behind the throne he heard a voice.

#### **VETERANS**

He didn't see the One speaking but heard, "Do you believe now?" Mr. Arriola replied, "Yes Master, I believe!"



He tells of another time while still quite young living on Hampton Rogers' farm west of Nacogdoches past the dam. His family worked for a tenant farmer, the only job in Nacogdoches they could find. A tornado was approaching suddenly, and he was terrified. God showed him in a vision how he should hide behind a well, so that's what he did with the tornado narrowly missing him. Another time he tells that while hunting, he came across a perfect cross made by two sticks. He asked the Lord, "What does this mean?" God was preparing him for the death of his first wife

of 45 years. It happened two days later.

In 1936, his family's crop failed, at which time his grandfather moved them closer to him to farm, but things got worse. At 11 years old, young James suggested to his parents they work for themselves, because he was getting tired of seeing the people they worked for having nice clothes and shoes when they hardly had enough to eat. That very day, Jack Johnson asked them to come and farm in Eden (later, James would name the road Seed Tick.) They had plenty of hardtack, two hogs, even a cow. They'd also attend school. They brought in 20 bushels of corn, and with what else was provided, were able to make a better living for themselves. He explains simply, "All my life, I've been old." I take this to mean wise, because as he explains, his mother, the drill sergeant of the family, would often send him to this neighbor or that neighbor for things their family needed. I imagine he had a way about him that was very likable. In the year 1943, JT Johnson took them across the Loco creek to farm; it was then their family began to acquire things money could afford.

There were many other stories he told of his family, as they were very close. A brother of his and sister both still live here in Nacogdoches. I asked him if he had a favorite Bible verse and he said that there are many. The letters from the Apostle Paul are some, but especially Galatians. He enjoys reading about Moses and Job. "I'm currently reading about King Saul, of how he turned his back on God and how God then anointed David to be king."

"George Poskey was my first customer" he said. "I told him so and asked him to come back later that day, that I'd have a gift for him. He enjoyed the bottle of whiskey and told his brother about me. Well his brother got a little upset thinking this barber was great offering a free gift with every haircut!" That first customer as well as his brother continued with Mr. Arriola as their barber! "I have one client that's been coming all 72 years I've been a barber." Loyalty was known and practiced by the "greatest generation."

Reponding to the question about how he got starting barbering, he says it was because he didn't like the haircuts his dad gave them, referring to

it as a "bowl" cut. He began his apprenticeship with Jack Hinds in 1948. And, though he's always started his workday at 7:00 bright and early, he now only works til 10 or 11:00 each day. During these hours, his barber pole is spinning. The remainder of his day, he watches his TV shows that include, "The Waltons," "Gunsmoke," and "The Rifleman" among others.

"By grace He saved me and I'm still here to be a witness to Him!" Mr. Arriola exclaims. Standing at just five feet, with a twinkle in his



eyes, he proclaims that mercy and grace is from Jesus alone, and while yet a sinner, He died for each of us.



#### **NPD Officer Jake Taylor**



On November 30th 2020 around 3:12 a.m. Officer Jake Taylor, a new officer with the Nacogdoches Police Department, was nine hours into a twelve hour shift and was finally heading to eat. It had been a slow night for officers, but things were about to quickly change.

As Officer Taylor was driving on North Street, he saw what he first thought was fog near an apartment building in the 1800 block of North Street. Officer Taylor slowed down and pulled over to further investigate and quickly realized he was dealing with a life and death fire emergency at the apartment building. Officer Taylor saw smoke and fire



coming from an apartment and immediately called for assistance, then began banging on apartment doors trying to wake up residents. Officer Taylor could see people on their balconies trying to escape the smoke and fire.

Other first responders began to arrive and fire personnel began using ladders to rescue people from the balconies. Police and Fire

personnel began forcing entry into apartments to make sure everyone was safely out of the building. Fire Department personnel from Nacogdoches, Lufkin, and Central Heights fought the fire for well over an hour before getting control of it.

Due to Officer Taylor's watchful eye and his and other first responder's quick response, only one person reported minor injuries. Officer Taylor stated, "I feel for the people that lost everything in the fire."

Within hours of the incident the local Red Cross began assisting those residents with any immediate needs. Assistant Chief Dan Taravella with the Nacogdoches Police Department stated, "We are very proud of Officer Taylor's actions. Police officers like Jake Taylor are a great example of the positive impact an officer can have on any given day."





#### **MONUMENT CORNER**

This month Monument Corner goes back to Calder (Cotton) Square at the intersection with W. Lufkin Ave. There are two monuments a few feet apart on the south corner in front of the present offices of Junior Achievement of Angelina County and a third across the street. The first monument reads as follows:

#### KERR'S INC.

REGARDED AS THE OLDEST ANGELINA COUNTY BUSI-NESS IN CONTINUOUS OPERATION. KERR'S BEGAN IN 1870 AS A GENERAL STORE IN THE EARLY COUNTY SEAT OF HOMER (5 MI. SE). IT WAS STARTED BY CIVIL WAR VETERAN CAPT. JOSEPH KERR (b. 1828), A NATIVE OF SOUTH CAROLI-NA. THE OPERATION WAS MOVED TO LUFKIN IN THE 1880s, SOON AFTER THE RAILROAD TOWN WAS FOUNDED. AN ACTIVE BUSINESS, CIVIC, AND POLITICAL LEADER, KERR WAS LATER SUCCEEDED IN THE FIRM BY HIS SONS. START-ED IN THE EARLY DAYS OF THE COUNTY AND LATER OPERATED AS A TIN SHOP, KERR'S INC. IS NOW A LEADER IN STEEL FABRICATION.

The second monument reads as follows:

SITE OF THE REHEARSAL HALL FOR

#### THE HOO HOO BAND

AT THE TURN OF THE CENTURY, A GROUP OF LUFKIN MEN ORGANIZED A TOWN BRASS BAND. IT LATER BECAME KNOWN AS THE HOO HOO BAND AFTER REPRESENTING TEXAS AT A NATIONAL CONVENTION OF THE ORDER OF HOO HOO, AN ORGANIZATION OF AMERICAN AND CANADIAN LUMBERMEN. IN ADDITION TO CONCERTS IN NEARBY COT-TON (CALDER) SQUARE, THE BAND PERFORMED AT VARI-OUS EVENTS AND ALSO DIRECTED SUCH CIVIC PROJECTS AS THE FORMATION OF THE TOWN'S FIRE DEPARTMENT. IN-ACTIVE BY THE 1920s WHEN SCHOOL BANDS BECAME



POPULAR. THE HOO HOO BAND REMAINS A SYMBOL OF LUFKIN'S EAR-LY CIVIC PRIDE AND QUALITY OF LIFE.

(Both markers were erected by the Texas Historical Commission.)

The third monument across the street reads as follows:

#### **CALDER (COTTON) SQUARE**

CITY'S HUB, 1882-EARLY 1900s, TEEMING WITH COTTON BUYING, HORSE TRADES, BAND CONCERTS, POLITICAL RALLIES, SWITCHING RAILROAD TRAINS. SITE OF FIRE STA-TION, STANDPIPE, 1933 MEMORIAL LIBRARY NAMED FOR

LUMBERMEN J. H. KURTH (1857-1930), SQUARE WAS RENAMED 1961 FOR KURTH FAM-ILY FRIEND, LOUIS CALDER (1879-1963) OF NEW YORK.



I thought that the clown had forgiven me for the practical joke on him, but I noted that at the next night's performance he had hired another officer to "arrest" him. So much for my clowning around.




