The Impacts of East Texas Rock & Roll!

In 1961 Johnny Luna, Bernard Garcia, and Alvin Poskey, all from the Moral community in Nacogdoches County, formed a group and began learning the words and the musicians' styles of various types of songs.

Frank Montes assisted by providing encouragement and comments of what sounded correct or needed improvement. The band became good at playing 20-25 songs all by ear; this was good because they could improvise, and change notes the way they wanted to feel the song for themselves. After a few months, the group settled on the name "The Impacts," and their first "gig" was at the Youth Center on Hughes Street, the meeting place for the Nacogdoches High School crowd. It was a joyful, but anxious moment, yet they were filled with pride to play in front of their fellow classmates. It went well but they were humbled when a song was requested, and they did not know it well enough.

The lesson learned was that they needed a larger play list with all types of music. Working hard to learn songs that were country, rhythm & blues, rock &

roll, and dance songs for mixed crowds of all ages provided confidence to play any song requested. Playing music of all types that people could dance to would be the focus of the band. They would not be a one-dimensional band.

This focus or goal provided many opportunities and requests to play at the SFA College Student Center and its activities, fraternity and sorority parties, VFW dances, Elk Lodges, the Caraban Club, the Sunset Club, the MaiKai Club, Club Chateau, Jacks Lounge and many other opportunities that were requested of

A story remembered by Johnny Luna: while playing at one of the night clubs, a gentleman came up to a band member and requested a song. He was told we did not know it. After politely showing us a firearm, we asked him to sing it and we would fill in. He did, we filled in, everyone was happy, and he gave us a big tip, and we were relieved. Playing all types of music will make people happy and dance.

Around 1964 the Impacts band members were Johnny Luna, singer; Bernard Garcia, lead guitar; Johnny Green, bass guitar; Joe Wayne Arriola, organ; and Fats Powell, drums. When members could not make it at times, fellow musicians would gladly fill in - they were Edwin Green (Johnny's father), Jackie Mayfield, Butch McIntyre, Danny Hall, Mike Gibbs, Fred Bright and Jimmy Daniels. These musicians were exceptional and played with various bands in East Texas.

The Impacts also had the pleasure of playing with Johnny Winter, a worldfamous blues singer and guitarist from Beaumont, TX, and J. Frank Wilson from Lufkin, who had a 1964 #1 hit record "Last Kiss."

While the Impacts did not become famous, they did experience wonderful memories and friendships. And who can forget the good food, especially the chicken fried steaks at John's Restaurant on South Street at 1 or 2 o'clock in the morning after playing at the night clubs.

The Impacts continued playing steadily and providing dance music in the East Texas area until Bernard (Marcy) and Johnny (Lorraine) married and moved away from East Texas in 1968. Friendships that were developed during this band experience grew because of the love of music, enjoyment and the love of seeing people dance and have fun. Individuals having the experience of playing in a band in small venues regardless of length of time will always enjoy the feeling that they have made a difference in someone's life.

"Do you want to make God laugh? Tell Him about your plans!" Eddie Rog-








Larry Emmon, author of A Burial Place and City of Fear.



Roaming Thru Time Around the Town

Where were we when we left off last time? Oh, yes, talking about how lucky I was as a lad in the 50s to be able to enjoy the benefits of roaming around downtown here in Nacogdoches, getting to know folks, meeting the business owners and employees, frequenting the picture shows, hanging out at my grandfather's soda fountain-all such wonderful memories!

Those folks who worked in the banks (Commercial National and Stone Fort National were all there were), workers in the stores, sold insurance or real estate, doctored the sick all came into the drugstore at least once but usually two or three times a day. Always they had time to speak to and answer the questions of the youngsters whose after school jobs or summer wanderings landed them downtown. My junior high (Thomas J.

Rusk) and high school campus was just about 3 ½ or 4 blocks from Main Street-an easy, quick back and forth hike for the teenagers inclined to make it happen. The commerce going on at all times provided the workforce that commingled with each other in a situation of camaraderie that doesn't quite so nicely exist today. Seemed like everyone had each other's back and all wanted and walked the same forward, onward, upward path.

I can remember five barbershops in the downtown area-each one keeping usually four barbers busy. Not many men or boys went more than 2 or 3 weeks without visiting

their favorite preferred barbernot infrequently was the haircut trip a combination for both father and son. Those establishments were great sources of news, practical jokes, and lasting friendships. I especially recall going to the barbershop section of the Walton-Ward beauty and barbershop at the intersection of Commerce and Church Streets some 65 years ago and I'm still there in the same building at the Milford

family shop. For years I visited my barber cousin, Marvin W. Stripling, and decades later for years I visited my friend, Gene Milford, whose chair stood in just about the same place

as my old cousin's did.

Stripling's Drugstore.

How about hardware stores? We had several good ones downtown-Royal Teel's Western Auto Store, Pool's down a bit and across the street from the Main Theater, Farmer's next to the old A&P store (later occupied by the Palace Seed Store), Branch Patton in the old Jonathan Cox building at Pecan and Main, and Cason Monk just down from Perry Brothers. Who can forget Cason Monk and its famous toyland upstairs during the Christmas holidays having in brief atten-

dance Santa Claus himself each year. The clerks knew just about everything about what nut, bolt, tool, utensil, sports equipment you needed, where they were, how much they cost! Appliances, radios, hunting clothes and fishing tackle-no problem. Up the road a piece on North Street south of First Baptist Church was Thomas Appliance whose motto

was "We service what we sell"-and indeed they did.

Speaking about Palace Seed Store as we did briefly above, I don't know that I've ever had a better on the grill delicious greasy cheeseburger than those served at the back of that grocery store. The buns were grilled to a sheen in the fat on the hot iron seldom wiped down griddle, the meat having been several times a day ground from butcher cuttings from the beef sides



What about the dimestores? Every

town large and small had a "five and ten

cents" store that were meccas for kids-

marbles, darts, checkers and other game-

boards, yo-yo's, slingshots, comic books.

Perry Brothers (owned by an old Lufkin family) on the north side of Main and McCrory's on the south side-what a great

soda fountain, plus hot roasted nuts (pop-

or quarters or roasts being hand trimmed up front. The burgers were wrapped in a waxy type paper and put in small paper bags to go. There were no chairs or tables, but if indeed you wanted to sit on a stack of burlap seed bags and eat there, you certainly could. I've seen 10 or 12 people at a time in the little, maybe 12'x12' back room getting bags of the 20¢ (later 25¢) burgers to take back to their co-workers blocks away.



A Nail in the Cash Register

"Now concerning the collection for the saints . . . on the first day of the week let each one of you lay something aside, storing up as he may prosper, that there be no collections when I come." 1 Corinthians 16:1-2 (NKJV)

Dr. Albert Schweitzer, counted as one of the great Christians of the twentieth century, was one of those followers who

was inspired by Christ's example. Dr. Schweitzer could have had the riches of the world if he had stayed in the field of music. He was excellent with both the piano and the organ. But he felt he could not be happy unless he served God in a more personal way.

When he reached the age of thirty, he read an article on the need for help in Africa. It was then that he decided to train as a doctor in order to go to Africa and serve God. It was perhaps no accident that it was on Good Friday, 1913, that he left his home for Africa. Once there he built a hospital where he was able to save many lives. Like his master, Dr. Schweitzer's example touched millions of people.

At one time in the congregation of the City Temple in London, there was a restaurant owner named Emil Mettler, who was a close friend of Albert Schweitzer. Mettler served as a kind of agent for Schweitzer in Britain.

Emil Mettler would never allow a person in full-time Christian service to pay for a meal in his restaurant. That was part of his commitment to the missionary movement. Once he did happen to open his cash register in the presence of the secretary of the London Missionary Society. The secretary was astonished to see among the bills and coins a six-inch nail. What was it doing there?

Mettler explained, "I keep this nail with my money to remind me of the price that Christ paid for my salvation and of what I owe Him in return."

After a thoughtful silence, the boy said, "Well, mainly it gives you the right to contribute again next year."



Rising After the Storm

Just a week removed from near zero temperatures across East Texas, we are enjoying the sunshine with temps well into the 70s. Only in Texas do we have such dramatic weather activity.

During the recent winter storm, TxDOT crews worked more than a week of 12-hour shifts. Crews will continue to monitor roadways for any problem areas and maintain them as needed. It is not unusual to see potholes following ice and snow on asphalt pavement, so our crews will be inspecting and working to fill these as they find them.

Many people don't realize all that it takes to get through a weather event like we had in February and still have passable, good roads. Prior to the winter storm and during the weather event, TxDOT crews placed 143,292 gallons of brine on district roadways in efforts to keep them passable and reduce the amount of snow and ice from freezing on the roadway. In addition, 3,265 pounds of melt down were placed where the build-up was heavier than what brine alone could handle. Also, 570 cubic yards, or about 48 dump trucks, of small rock were placed to help with traction. Another 150 tons of salt were also placed on district roadways.

During the event, several agencies and businesses worked to help TxDOT clear the roads including about 30 contractor personnel and 20 various county and city employees. Rising from this type of weather challenge was easier because of those who jumped in to help our crews clear the roads sot they could remain open.

A huge thank you to the following: Drewery Construction, which helped Tx-DOT crews throughout the district with manpower and equipment; Texas Department of Public Safety, City of Lufkin Street Department, City of Lufkin Water Department, Lufkin Police Department, City of Diboll Water Department, Angelina County Commissioners and workers from Precincts 3 and 4, Sterling Lumber Company, Houston County Sheriff's Department, City of Crockett, Houston County Commissioners and crews, Shelby County Sheriff's Department, Polk County Commissioner's and crews, City of Livingston, Polk County Sheriff's Department, Onalaska Police Department, San Jacinto County volunteer fire departments, Trinity County Judge Doug Paige, Trinity County Commissioner Steven Truss and crew, and Area Wide Protective, Inc.

As we get back to our normal lives with our essential infrastructure elements such as electricity, water and heat, know that our East Texas roadways are ready for travel. Our workers rose to the challenge and we have emerged as a community realizing once again how much we need each other and that it truly takes us all working together and helping each other to get through the tough times.

What Is Black Light – Part I

Hoodwinked. Bamboozled. Deceived. These words describe the state of the body of Christ, the Christian church. Since its inception, Satan has lied to and deceived the people of God in order to gain a foothold in the church. The devil is




Which is about the time when Terry took up cowboying.

A Man of Service, Valor and Courage - Milton Sowell

A man of service, valor, and courage. A man that is faithful, loyal, and purposed. A man with a sense of responsibility, humility, and integrity. Milton Connard Sowell, a man who served his country. An East Texan who spent 20 years of his youngest adult years, serving in the United States Army, for us. For you

and I, Milton Connard Sowell served.

better at this duty than his sergeant.

He saw much of the world outside of Nacogdoches during his 20 years of service. First in Korea and then Korea again for a total of two tours. Germany for six years and finally Vietnam where he'd risen to the rank of SFC or sergeant first class.

He explains about his army career, "When I saw a private first class and I became a private first class; then I saw a drill sergeant, I became a drill sergeant." It was clear, he was driven to accomplish whatever he set his mind to do. It had been twenty years since he enlisted and much had happened in that time.

Mr. Sowell was born in August 1933, telling his story from the back porch of his nephew's house. He was born in Nacogdoches and raised in the country on Appleby Sand Road before you get to the high school. Of course, there was no high school there, but there was a lot of sand!

He grew up alongside five sisters and four brothers. His much older brother was by far his favorite; it may be because he mentioned to his older brother that he didn't have a bike to get around. That afternoon, his brother, who was 20 years older, had gotten him a bicycle. With this he could ride into town, and with the earnings he made at the filling station, he watched a lot of movies.

The fifty cents he earned cleaning car windows and such was better than whatever he made working as a "swamper" for 7-Up bottling plant. A swamper he explained rode in the truck on deliveries. His nephew and his older brother worked there too; in fact, his brother retired after 41 years of employment, passing just a few days later.

Milton Sowell grew up like any other boy in Nacogdoches going to the tall stately school in Washington Square, the one that's now TJR Elementary school. He said he was like all others in that he liked chasing after pretty girls and hanging out with his best friend, Floyd.

It may have been the movies he liked watching that led him to a life distinguished from the other boys, the ones that depicted John Wayne as a war hero. Right after graduation, he enlisted in the United States Army, soon finding out that boot camp was a far cry from what he saw in the movies. Drill sergeants were never this angry or violent towards the candidates in the movies, but this made Mr. Sowell more thickened to stay in. In fact, he became a drill sergeant himself and determined to be

Twelve months between 1969-1970 was spent in Vietnam in combat and that's when he decided it was to time for him to retire. Maybe it was the end of his career in Vietnam that created a bit of a dark cloud for the former years, because in the telling of this part, he became lost in his memories, as if struggling to put into words what he'd kept silent about until now.

First off, when he arrived in Vietnam, he explains that there was no time to think; you didn't look to the left or right, you just faced forward and kept going. There was no time in Vietnam, just combat. "Before I knew it, a year had passed without having time to think about what had hap-

pened," he explained.



He was a tank commander which is someone who received and passed on orders to three other tanks, each with four troops operating different aspects of the M48 Patton. As commander, he gave the orders to the driver and gunner all while leading other tanks and providing

infantry-support. He went from shooting a 22 as a boy to shooting a 90 mm from the M48 "heavy" he commanded.

The worst weapon the VC (Viet Cong) had against tanks was the RPG, a rifle propelled grenade. But, they also had unscrupulous battle tactics. At one point, they'd put a deceased woman in their path hoping to deter VETERANS - Page 21

them from their mission. Sowell explained that that was no place for a woman, she had no business being there. To this day he said he can still remember her face.

"As the enemy lay on the floor of the jungle waiting to ambush, they looked like leaves on the ground. There were so many of them," he



explained. "It was kill or be killed. There's a number stuck in my head, the number 360, but it might be 630; and that's the number that I was told were killed." It was as if Sowell's mind could not comprehend that many people dying, let alone that he'd been part of it.

When asked about his faith, he said "I never thought about God (while in Vietnam)." He now enjoys reading his Bible and has given God thanks for bringing him back alive.

Seeing combat for a year must place tremendous strain on a person, and especially in Mr. Sowell's position commanding troops half his age. "They called me grandpa," he said. "You didn't go anywhere at night if you wanted to live. And at night, we circled the tanks to create a perimeter, outside that three strands of alert wire. One solider per tank was on watch while the others slept on the ground on the inside of that circle."

The food was not bad, but fresh water was hard to find and there were times when we were "real thirsty." A year after his return to the states from Vietnam, he discovered he had malaria. He thought he remembered a night when his patrol had found some water, treating it to prevent malaria, "we must not have waited long enough!" "I had no idea I had it. I was tough and didn't let anything slow me down, but one day I just fell over!" Upon examination, the doctor guessed he'd had it almost a year.

He had married a young girl he had once seen looking up wide-eyed at him as he worked as a "swamper." They had two children, William, and Laura. When he got home, his children hardly recognized him, his skin was so thick and dark from exposure to the sun. He was 39 years old having served half of his life in the army.

There was no parade or fanfare upon returning from Vietnam and adjusting to living was a challenge. "It was a different nation than what I remembered," he explained.

Sowell was awarded the Bronze Star and the Army Commendation Metal with Valor, both issued due to meritorious service during combat situations.

With the money he earned in the service, he bought a house with some land west of Nacogdoches. It's this house he still lives in and the yard of which he still mows to this day. He has five grandchildren whose weekly visits he really enjoys. They have a real love for him, too, and show it by doing chores for him. Greg Sowell, his nephew that lives next door is quick to say that he, too, shares in the chores by taking out his trash.

His second career, that also lasted 20 years was working for Lone Star Feed. He retired from that job when he turned 65.

He helped raise a son who serves as Nacogdoches County Constable Precinct 1 and a nephew who "might as well have been a son" who serves as our County Judge. You might conclude that these men saw something in Milton Sowell, something to which was important enough to attain. Winston Churchill once said, "Never, never, never, never—in nothing, great or small, large or petty—never give in, except to convictions of honor and good sense. Never yield to force. Never yield to the apparently overwhelming might of the enemy."

Maybe it's this perseverance or, maybe, a stubbornness that people had earlier on in the making of our great country that helped make this place in which we live a safe and fruitful country. To Mr. Sowell and ALL our veterans, we are thankful for your service and the freedoms it affords each of us to enjoy.



Roofing Answers from a Local Roofing Contractor What Are IR and AR Ratings for Shingles?

IR "impact resistant" shingles are usually thicker than typical shingles and can better resist the "blow" of hail than the typical shingle. They are tested by the manufacturers by dropping a heavy object from a specified height to determine the damage that natural elements can cause. Most manufacturers of shingles make IR rated shingles. This is especially important in areas of the country where large hail is a common phenomenon.

The good news: they work and many home insurers will give you a significant discount on your premiums if you provide adequate documentation for them that you have an IR shingle installed on your house. Also, this



To change the subject: Most shingles now produced have an additive in the "gravel" part of the shingle to resist the growth of algae. Of course, some shingles are more effective in resisting algae growth than others.

What to do if your shingles get streaks? Typically these streaks are not algae but mildew. We all know that a bleach mixture of 15% with water will help take the mildew off and "slow" it's return. My suggestion for most homeowners: if the "pitch" or angle of your roof isn't too steep for you to walk on, next time it rains, let the rain wet the roof, walk on the roof with a pump up sprayer and spray the bleach mixture onto the shingles and let the RAIN rinse off the roof. This way you won't need to use a water hose or pressurized water to clean the roof. And the bleach mixture will NOT damage your plants when it falls to the ground.

Some people believe that steel roofs do not get streaks like shingle roofs, but that is simply not true. Here in Nacogdoches we have many steel roofs that have "streaked" due to the growth of mildew. What causes the mildew growth? Moisture. We are in a humid climate here in East Texas and mildew is an unavoidable part of living in the prettiest part of the State of Texas.





Sheriff Kevin Windham -


Serving Shelby County With Integrity and Professionalism

This month's Monument Corner travels to Garrison in Nacogdoches County. We visit the Hotel Wiley. The hotel located downtown on the east side of the railroad tracks bears on its fron porch an historical marker from the Texas Historical Commission. The marker reads as follows:

HOTEL WILEY

TOWN OF GARRISON WAS FOUNDED IN 1885. BY ABOUT 1900 THE HOTEL WILEY, OWNED BY MRS. S. A. (MATTIE) WILEY, WAS IN FULL OPER-ATION. THE HOTEL WAS FREQUENT-ED BY RAILROAD AND TELEPHONE WORKERS, TRAVELING SALESMEN AND TOWNSPEOPLE WHO ENJOYED MRS. WILEY'S FAMILY STYLE MEALS IN THE DINING ROOM. AT ONE TIME THE HOTEL HAD ABOUT 38 ROOMS INCLUDING A TWO-STORY ANNEX THAT LATER WAS REMOVED. THE STRUCTURE IS A FINE EXAMPLE OF AN EARLY 20TH CENTURY RAILROAD HOTEL, EXHIBITING QUEEN ANNE STYLE INFLUENCES IN ITS HIPPED ROOF, DECORATIVE SPINDLE WORK LOWER CROSS GABLES. **WINDOWS** MULTI-LIGHT DORMER AND WRAPAROUND PORCH.



You never know when or where you might meet twins. At the movies, at the grocery store, at church, or at the mall they may be found. Most of the time they are dressed alike to further confuse the general public. Remember the advertisement for "Double Mint" gum – "double the pleasure, double the fun with Double Mint gum." Of course, there were twin young ladies showing off a package of gum.

I recall meeting a set of twins in the summer of 1973 in Houston, Texas. Unfortunately, the meeting was not planned, nor was it a positive situation. Mr. O'Neal always had a revolver strapped on his hip in plain view as a silent warning to those who would dare think of robbing him. It was a good deterrent, as were the constant stream of county patrol cars.

On this particular evening, as we were completing the refueling task, a car drove up to us, the driver yelling in our direction, "See that old car there on Little York," pointing to an old Chevrolet headed west. "Yes, I see it, "I replied. "What's the problem?" The excited driver yelled, "He's drunk as a skunk. He almost ran me off the road!" I waved at the citizen as we got into the patrol car while assuring him that we would go check out the driver.

Pulling our powerful Plymouth Fury out on Little York we sped up to the point that we could see the weaving Chevrolet a couple of blocks ahead. We finally were close enough to pull him over to the shoulder of the road. My partner walked up to the driver side, and I covered the passenger side. Neither of us was quite ready for the sight that greeted us inside that vehicle. The driver and passenger were identical twins, and both identically drunk. There was a strange aroma in the vehicle – not cigarette smoke, cigar smoke, or pot, but a different smell.

After getting both men out of the vehicle, I examined the interior of the car while my partner put handcuffs on both of them. I found several empty wine bottles on the back seat, and one about half empty on the front. I spotted a couple of partially eaten sandwiches on the dash. I picked one up and there it was, the strange smell. I took a quick whiff and dropped the sandwich on the seat.


It turned out that these twins both worked at a butcher shop in north Houston. They had made several sandwiches out of raw ground meat before leaving their store. I suppose it is like the man said once when he kissed a cow – everyone to his own taste. Apparently raw meat between slices of white bread, washed down by wine, makes a good meal for some people. After placing both of them in the Humble jail, we headed for the restroom to wash the delicacy off our hands, but the smell lingered for the rest of our shift. One just does not find twins like these two very often, for which I thank the good Lord.
