"IMPACT is a 501(c)(3) non-profit organization located in Nacogdoches and formed for one purpose – to make a difference in the life of children in need. IMPACT operates a retail store at 801 E. Main between University and Lanana Street downtown. You may also drop off donations (of anything!) at this address. We use what we can for the children, and sell the rest to raise the much needed funds to supply the things that are not donated. We started out with the thought of providing luggage and duffle bags so that children coming in to foster care do not have to be moved in garbage bags; then we did Christmas gifts for all foster children from the Nacogdoches area in 2010, 2011, 2012,

Johnson Furniture - Four Generations Serving Nacogdoches and the Surrounding Area

Bolivar Johnson was working at Cason-Monk Furniture & Funeral Home in 1959 when he decided that he would start his own store in Downtown Nacogdoches. He probably had no idea that by the year 2016 his store would be run by

his grandson and great-grandson and would also be the longest continuously-operating downtown business.

He sold everything he could do without for startup funds. He then rented the small building at 106 E. Main from Jesse Millard for \$35 per month on August 1, 1959. Mr. Johnson bought inventory and opened the doors, choosing to "carry his own paper," offering financing to customers. He would work all day in the store, then make deliveries after 5pm every day. At first, business was very slow and he would often load his truck and head out to the auction barn and to other locations to "peddle" his merchandise. Mrs. Albert Thomas owned several adjacent buildings, as well as one across the street, and Bolivar leased those from her in the 1960s. After Mrs. Thomas and Mr. Millard passed away, the Johnsons purchased all of the buildings from the estates.

Haden Johnson began helping his dad at the store part-time while working at NIBCO, quitting after 20-years in 1974 to begin working full-time at the store. Bolivar worked at the store until his health declined. He passed away in 1993. Haden's son, Randy, graduated from Texas A & M and worked for an engineering firm in Houston until he joined the company on February 1, 1979. Randy's son, Jared, also a Texas A & M Graduate, joined in 2010 after Haden died.



Crockpot Annie's, Food for the Soul

We've all heard about these little out-of-the-way, hard-to-find places with amazing food. Crockpot Annie's Soul food is one of those places and it's located right here in The Oldest Town in Texas.

As a child growing up in Nacogdoches, Annie Forney Christopher learned to cook from her mother, Cora Lee, and her aunt, Olle Ree James. They cooked the "old fashioned way" with only fresh ingredients and that's the way that Annie cooks today. "I do all of the cookin' because I don't want anybody messin' up my recipes," she recently told us. Her family, friends and neighbors always raved about her food, so she had cards made up and started making take-out lunches for folks from her home many years ago. She attended beauty college in the front of the building which she operates her restaurant from today. "That just wasn't my thing, so I drove a school bus for 13-years. I would have as many as sixty 4-year-olds on the bus...Started the route at 5 a.m. and then took them all home after school. I loved it, but it was a challenge," Annie said. She also cooked at Hotel Fredonia for 5-years back in the 80s and briefly operated Annie's Soul Food on South Street in 2000. The current restaurant opened in March, 2016.

The ever-changing menu includes: Oxtails with bell peppers & onions with brown gravy, roasted chicken legs, golden fried pork chops, Dorito casserole, chicken etoufee, golden fried chicken, fried catfish every other friday, barebeque brisket, chicken, links, turkey legs and smoked tamales on every other Saturday, chicken & dressing every Sunday, meat loaf, smothered pork chops, smothered liver and onions, beef tips and rice, pork tips and rice, "chittlins" and more. Chili and gum-

bo will be added during winter months. A large variety of vegetables, including: Pinto beans, collard greens, turnip greens, dirty rice, white rice, mac and cheese, cabbage, fresh daily-made mashed potatoes, steamed broccoli and more. Hot water or regular baked cornbread is also included with each meal. Homemade desserts include: Lemon pie; caramel, pound, strawberry and German Chocolate

cakes; homemade tea cakes; bread pudding and sweet potato cobbler. Tea, Kool Aid and soft drinks are served in huge fruit jars.

Annie's children, Regina, Roderick, Lakethia and Justin all pitch in to help run the restaurant. Annie proudly told us that she also has 21 grandchildren and 24 great-grandchildren. "Hopefully, they'll all be helping us here some day," she said.

Crockpot Annie's Soul Food is located in the rear of the building located at 1008 East Main Street. Parking is available behind the building and the entrance is a side-door facing the back of the former "Mr. Q" Service Station at the corner of East Main and South University Drive. Open from 11 a.m. "until sold out" Wednesday through Sunday. It's best to phone ahead 936.371.1484 to check the menu for the day, as it's never the same.



Classes will run from 08:00 -12:00 pm and 1:00 pm to 5:00 pm on both days. 8 students per class is the maximum number allowed. There will be two classes each day that are four hours long.

Required Equipment: Must bring ATV machine with following equipment:

- Helmet
- Gloves
- Long Pants
- Boots
- Eye Protection



Nacogdoches County has unfortunately had too many accidents over the last several years, where we have seen people killed or severely injured operating an ATV machine. Our goal of these classes is to help educate our youth on how to safely operate an ATV machine and to help prevent these accidents from occurring in our community. With no dedicated bike lanes in Nacogdoches, I see many college students riding bikes to school, motorists rushing around them to get to work and cyclists enjoying a morning ride to get the blood pumping. The danger is greater if any one of them becomes distracted.

The statutes within the Texas Transportation Code are considered the "rules of the road." The laws are designed to improve safety for everyone who travels Texas roadways. Cyclists and motorists, young and old, should be educated to cycling laws so that neither becomes an accident statistic.

The number one rule for cyclists and motorists is to use a signal to communicate with each other what your intentions are when you are planning to make a turn on the roadway.

As a reminder to all motorists and cyclists, the rules of the road that could save your life include:

- Bicyclists have the rights and duties as any other vehicle operators (Tx Trans. Code 551.101). That means we all must stop at signal lights and stop signs. A vehicle is required to yield right-of-way to a bicycle, just as it would to any other vehicle.
- Ride near the curb and go in the same direction as other traffic (Tx Trans. Code 551.103). This one was always hard for me. I always wanted to ride against the traffic, but that is incorrect.
- Keep one or both hands on the handlebars at all times (Tx Trans. Code 551.102c). Kids cannot help themselves. We have all wanted to feel the freedom.
 - One rider per bike (Tx Trans. Code 551.102a).
- You must have a white light on the front and a red reflector or light on the rear (Tx Trans. Code 551.1104b).
 - Brakes should be capable of making the braked wheel skid (Tx Trans. Code 551.104a).

I invite you to read the full list of requirements for cyclists located in the Texas Transportation Code, http://www.statutes.legis.state.tx.us. You will find information and laws for any mode of transportation included.

I cannot think of many things more fun on a Fall day than to get outdoors with family and friends. Walk, drive or ride a bike. Browse through the antique shops downtown, go to Stephen F. Austin State University and take in an art exhibit or make a trip out to Farmer's Market to enjoy some of the season's best.

Just remember - If you ride on these brick streets, whether on two wheels or four, share the road, respect everyone on the road, be safe and enjoy the ride.

Angela's Monthly Recipe Creole Pork Chops

Angela Bradford is the owner/operator of Appleby Sand Mercantile Cafe' in Nacogdoches.

Ingredients for 6 servings:

6 (1-inch thick) pork loin chops (about 1-1/2 pounds)

1/2 cup all-purpose flour

2 tablespoons vegetable oil

1 medium onion, chopped

1/2 cup chopped green pepper

1 (14-1/2 ounce) can whole tomatoes, undrained and chopped

1-1/2 teaspoons Worcestershire sauce

1 teaspoon salt

1/4 teaspoon pepper

Hot cooked rice

Preparation:

Dredge pork chops in flour. Brown on both sides in oil in a large skillet over medium heat. Drain on paper towels. Remove drippings from skillet, reserving 1 tablespoon in skillet.

Sauté onion and green pepper in hot drippings until tender. Add tomatoes, Worcestershire sauce, salt, and pepper. Return pork chops to skillet. Cover and simmer 1 hour or until pork chops are tender.

Sam Rayburn **Lake Report**

Oh my, the summer of September is gone, but we are bringing in the fall of October. Football is in full swing and the World Series is coming soon. But, if one steps outside and feels the muggy temperatures still in the 90's, you know your still deep in the heart of East Texas.

We are excited to know that cooler temperatures are on their way. The water on Sam Rayburn is clearing up and down the lake. The Corps has stated that the lake is about to complete its turn over, which should lead to higher oxygen levels and better fishing.

Fishing has been up and down, but with cold fronts on the way, water and air temperatures decreasing means fishing activity will be increasing. The water temperature is constant between 84-89 degrees and the lake level is decreasing and is about 1.5' low. Black Bass have been great around the piers and boat docks. Just like what we have at Shirley Creek Marina. These docks hold a lot of bait fish during this time of year which in turn bring in all kinds of dominant predator fish. Crappie and Catfish hang around in good numbers in and around the shaded areas also. Black Bass are hitting plastics fished any style. I have had better luck on senko's fished short Carolina style around the boat stalls. Also, water poppers, watermelon buzz baits and dark crank baits in 10-15' around the grass line and points. Different types of darker colored plastics fished Texas Rig around brush early are bringing in limits. White Bass are fair on minnows and small jig spinners on creek and river and creek entrances. Crappie are still hit and miss, but are good on minnows and chartreuse with white jig heads over brush piles in 15'-25' of water when you find good structure. Some are still suspended in 1'-15'. Anchored brush piles in around 15' are bringing in the best numbers of crappie. Also some decent stringers are still coming in from under the Hwy 103 and 147 bridges along the creek and river channels. Bream are great on all kinds of worms and around the trees in deeper water. Channel Catfish seem to be caught more frequently on worms, shrimp and shad. Good size Blue Cats up to 20 lbs. are coming in on live Perch and cut bait but are slow. Different punch baits are also bringing in limits. Baiting holes with cattle range cubes will definitely increase your odds to get to that limit. Nice size flathead cats up to 30 lbs. are coming in off noodles, jugs and trot lines baited with live perch, cut bait and shad on channel drop offs but slow.

Remember to visit us at the Shirley Creek Marina Bait Shop. We have live Minnows, Goldfish, and now have live Perch. We are the only bait shop that sells native live Perch. As my Poppy always said; "The worst day fishing is still better than the best day at work." God Bless and Good Fish'n.

Nacogdoches, The Oldest Town in Texas . . . Rich in History and Texas Culture, Features The Sterne-Hoya House Museum and Library

Editor's Note: In this space each month we hope to provide our readers with information regarding many of the unique historical features that make up our wonderful city.



The Sterne-Hoya House was built by Adolphus Sterne in 1830. Sterne was an immigrant from Cologne, Germany. During a sojourn through Tennessee, he became friends with Sam Houston. He moved to Nacogdoches in 1826. He was a financier of the Texas Revolution. When Texas became a state, Sterne served in both houses of the legislature. In 1830, he built the house at 211 S. Lanana Street. Davy Crockett was a guest in the house for two weeks of 1835. Sam Houston was baptized into the Catholic faith in the parlor of this house, thereby meeting the requirements of the Mexican government to settle in Coahuila y Tejas and own property.

The house is a 1-1/2 story wood frame construction on a brick pier foundation. A Victorian porch serves as the entrance. On the same lot, to the rear of the main house, is the servants quarters. Sterne also built a stable, smoke house, hen house and corn crib on the property, but they no longer exist. Sterne made modifications and repairs in the two decades following the home's original construction.

Charles Hoya was a county surveyor in Nacogdoches, operating the Hoya Land Office Building on the downtown square. His father Joseph T. Von der Hoya was a Prussian immigrant. Hoya, his wife Frances, and his father lived in the house at 211 S. Lanana, which the Hoya family purchased in 1866.
