



NHSAA Distinguished Alumni Announced


The NHS Alumni Association is proud to honor Loretta Rice Cammack as our Distinguished Alumnus for the Fall of 2025.




Christian Women's Job Corps

Greetings, Friends and Neighbors.

Living close to the Sabine River on the Louisiana side is not much different than the Texas side except the fact the river separates the two states. At some point and time, I have lived on the Texas side and reside now on the Louisiana side, giving me the opportunity to know people from both sides!

Since we live about fifty miles from Nacogdoches and about fifty miles from Shreveport, we can go either direction if we need to run into town. The good news is, I have family in Nacogdoches and that gives me ample reason to go that way.

Living in a small community like Logansport or Joaquin, we have to drive a few miles to get some of the things we might need. Since it's basically the same distance either way, we can go to Nacogdoches or to Shreveport if we want to go shopping.

I enjoy living out in the country, but there is not a whole lot that goes on around here on a daily basis.

In May, we have our annual River City Fest here on the riverfront (LA side). They always have a carnival and food booths and live entertainment.

In July, over in Center there is the Watermelon Festival – I've only been to it a few times in years gone by but that is the month we go on vacation so we're rarely home. The grandkids enjoy the carnival rides though. Not me! I enjoy the funnel cakes and cotton candy when I do get the chance to be there.

In October, the East Texas Poultry Festival comes to Center, TX on the square for 3 days of fun, food & festivities. There are carnival rides, food and a lot more.

As a young girl, I grew up in the Tenaha area. I remember when I was in eighth grade – my friends and I would walk to town from school everyday during lunch break. My brother Eddie worked at the old Rite Care Hatchery right out of town on US Hwy 59 between Tenaha and Timpson. He'd meet me at the old Wall Drug Store on the square and buy me a hamburger and shake for lunch.

I'm not sure if the Tenaha High school allows the students off the campus anymore but it worked for me! Times have changed drastically since the 1970s.

My parents, Fred and Effie Stone, managed the Hilltop Chicken Farm (owned by Rite Care) on Highway 59 between Tenaha and Carthage back in those days. That particular farm and the hatchery is no longer there now. I think everything is owned by Tyson now.

There was a girl (my best friend) named Sandra Prevost (her parents also worked for Rite Care) that lived close to us. She was in the 9th grade and I was in the 8th at Tenaha High School in 1974.

We lost contact when I ended up moving to Houston that year and I never saw or heard from her again. I have thought of her often and have asked friends about her but no one seems to know whatever happened to her or where she might have relocated to. That was about fifty years ago so there's no telling where she went or if she is still alive. I came back to Tenaha several times several years after moving to Houston but I never found out where she moved to.

If anyone knows the whereabouts of her, please let me know. I found one **Sandra Prevost** on social media but apparently it wasn't her. Buc-ees Origin

For the traveling Texan, and now other states, Buc-ees is a required stop. It is not just a gas station and convenience store; it has become a tourist destination with an international cult following. The stories about this phenomenon begin the same, "Everything is bigger in Texas and Buc-ees is definitely BIG."

It is an American success story of taking a common business and doing it bigger and better than anyone else. What did they do different and who is "they"? "They" are Arch "Beaver" Alpin III and his behind the scenes partner, Don Wasek. It all started in Clute, Texas with a single convenience store or C-store. Nothing that special at all. A handful of gas pumps and the usual drinks and snacks. This is not a business for the lazy. It is indeed the opposite of "passive" income.

I have a friend that had a small C-store in the early 80s that he described as a prison, "You are locked in every day and surrounded by thieves, customers and employees." That is when Buc-ees began in 1982 with the same footprint and business model as everyone else, but Alpin had a dream.



Henry Taylor Millard, known as Taylor, to almost everyone, grew up in Nacogdoches with a story telling father and a history reading mother. Taylor is a seventh generation Texan and lives on the same family land dating back to the eighteen-thirties. He and his wife attend Old North Baptist Church that his great-great-grandmother assisted in founding in 1838.

In 2003 the first of what we think of as Buc-ees was built in Luling, Texas. It had very clean bathrooms, no large trucks, custom snacks, freshly baked

pastries, a wall of jerky, and barbecue sandwiches. It was bold and a very big risk, but it is my belief, Alpin had proof it would work from another place called Prasek's in Hillje, Texas. Prasek's sat on Highway 59 south of Houston 50 miles and about 50 miles north of Victoria.

If you were traveling to hunt or fish in South Texas, a stop at Prasek's was always a good idea. Long before the Buc-ees empire existed, I was pulling into get some fresh baked sweets, barbecue and jerky in Hillje. My old friend Jimmy Tipton and I loved to stop on our way to quail hunt in Falfurrias. My last trip with my father to a Zapata, Texas dove hunt, we pulled over for a kolache and a barbecue lunch. A few weeks ago it was to pick up some cookies for the Victoria County judge's office while working on my Alamo Letter Society project.

Prasek's has grown over the fifty plus years themselves. The store is bigger and nicer and they have custom meat products in HEB stores. Hard work and dedication by the same family for generations is a grand testament to us all. In a world that is rapidly changing with AI as our predicted future, it is nice to see old fashioned good food and service win.

Now maybe as you see the iconic beaver billboards to guide you to one of their 54 locations and growing, you will think of where I believe they got the idea. Not saying I'm right, but it is a good theory.

Share the Road Safely in Texas



Energy Zones

Nearly 25% of statewide traffic deaths are in oil and gas regions

The Texas energy industry fuels jobs, economic growth and opportunity across the state, but the added truck traffic can bring unique challenges to drivers.

To help keep everyone safe in energy producing areas, the Texas Department of Transportation (TxDOT) is encouraging all motorists to be extra vigilant and always drive like a Texan: kind, courteous and safe.

Oil and gas production activity means large trucks and heavy machinery share the road with local traffic on rural roads and highways. Increased truck traffic can mean limited visibility for drivers and wear and tear on road surfaces, potentially creating hazards that are difficult to navigate and maneuver around.

While our oil and gas sectors may have been built with the grit and adventurous spirit of roughnecks and wildcatters, when it comes to driving in energy-producing areas, motorists should be more cautious than bold.

Crash statistics

- In 2024, 78,980 traffic crashes occurred in Texas' five main energy regions—the Permian Basin, Eagle Ford Shale, Barnett Shale, Anadarko Basin and the Haynesville/Bossier Shale.
- Combined, these regions saw a slight decline in crashes compared to the previous year and traffic fatalities were down 5%.
- Yet 1,023 people were killed in roadway crashes, accounting for one in four of the state's total traffic fatalities in 2024.
- Failure to control speed and driver inattention were the top two factors contributing to crashes in these regions.

Safety tips

To help keep yourself and other Texans safe when driving in oil and gas areas, TxDOT offers these important reminders:

- Drive a safe speed. Follow posted speed limits and adjust your driving to match road conditions.
- Stay alert and focus 100% on driving. That means putting your phone away: no talking or texting when behind the wheel.
- Give large trucks plenty of space. Be patient and pass trucks only when it's safe and legal to do so.
- Maintain a safe following distance. Tailgating is a common factor contributing to traffic crashes.
- Avoid trucks' blind spots. If you can't see the truck driver in the truck's side mirror, the driver can't see you or your vehicle.
- Always get a sober ride. Even one drink of alcohol is enough to impair your judgment.
- Obey all stop signs and traffic signals. They're not suggestions!
- Always buckle up. That includes drivers and passengers, day and night, every ride.

To get this message out and encourage cautious driving, TxDOT's **Be Safe. Drive Smart.** campaign will showcase an interactive traffic safety exhibit at high school football games in the Permian Basin, Barnett Shale and Eagle Ford Shale. The mobile exhibit will feature quizzes, games and video displays that remind motorists to slow down and stay focused when driving in energy regions.

The Be Safe. Drive Smart. campaign is an important part of TxDOT's Drive like a Texan: Kind. Courteous. Safe. initiative. Drive like a Texan is about embracing the pride, camaraderie and responsibility of being a Texan on the road. By making thoughtful choices, we can all help keep each other safe. They sat, two rows, directly behind us and appeared at the last minute for every show, giving everyone a view of the "unholy" entourage as it moved, feebly, along the aisle and up the eight or so steps to their season ticket position in the theater. Her presence initiated an emotional response in me as I considered who she was and what she had done effecting my life.

Grasping a cane for support, Madeline Murray O'Hair could hardly walk, as her son Jon and granddaughter Robin assisted her to her seat. There seemed to be something a little "off" with them all.

My memory went back to how a couple of teachers had treated me because of my faith. In auditorium class, the grade school attempt at teaching government, I was not allowed to participate nor was I included in the holiday celebrations with the other kids. In order to prevent me from having to take part, I was given a seat, in the back of class, away from everyone else. Failing to realize the act was an overreaction by some intolerant teacher, or that they were just protecting me from violating my beliefs, I blamed it on Christianity and began to gather resentments I would carry for a long time.

Although the Supreme Court agreed with her, the Dallas schools, where I attended, continued with morning prayer, over the PA system, until after I left in 1966.

There were times, during intermissions, that I wanted to turn around and thank her for what she had done to that group who had wronged me but I had recently become a Christian and some odd feeling made me hesitate. I never approached her. For, with time, I had begun to realize that, maybe, what she did was not a favor.

It may have just been the progress of societal evolution or it could have been the moral guidance which prayer brought to the classroom, but the deterioration of our society seems to have exponentially increased since her request and the court's decision. As a child, I felt hurt by my exclusion and carried that into adulthood for many years, fueled by emotion, ignorance and anger, that served me to no advantage in life, as I rebelled against God and "The Establishment."

I watched as they came and sat, and as they took intermission in the lobby, not interacting with others. Knowing there were many in the crowd who were agnostics and atheists, I expected her to have, at least, a little following of people who greeted and spoke with one of the most influential people of the 20th century. Could it be that most questioned the actual results of her cause and actions, or was it watching their social skills and demeanor that seemed to prevent people from approaching them? And then maybe it was just what I perceived...but it seemed something was not quite right about them.

After watching a public service TV show with her son, Jon Garth, explaining why there was no God, I realized he wasn't the sharpest knife in the drawer. And after seeing Madeline's entourage, on a regular basis, I failed to understand how such a pathetic group had swayed the courts of our country to give in to them.

As I grew in the love of Christ and began to see how His Grace and Mercy had brought me through the years in safety, it became more and more evident that Madeline had been wrong. Without prayer in schools, our public institutions have become a battle zone instead of learning centers. The real disappointment lies in that her persistence, loud voice and threats gave her victory in the courts, with no research or thought to what the results would be. She was just loud in getting her way as the old adage "The Squeaky Wheel Gets the Grease" plays out, too often, in our courts and society today.

With no moral compass, our country has become "inclusive" to a point that irrational behavior is acceptable. Absurd and even criminal behavior is to be, not only tolerated, but celebrated. Our search for God has ended and the results are plain and simple, as people want to be anything but what God made them to be. A culture of destruction had raised it's head in a country that has always been dedicated to making the world a better place for ourselves and the rest of the world.

It did not surprise me when, after a couple of no-shows, public news all over the country announced their disappearance, as the O'Hair family, was accused of fleecing their nonprofit. The news of the entourage's deaths that came a few days after failing to show up at the plays, should be a reminder of how a loud voice may not be the best one to follow or give in to.





This happens so often lately, when new issues arise, we take a breath and continue doing all we can and then we wait. Living while knowing Jesus truly is in control and believing it every day takes practice!

Our community's nonprofits and organizations are deeply committed to working together to support neighbors striving to build a better quality of life. Recently, several organizations pulled together to serve a family who had a difficult situation. A family member intervened and rescued another family member from an abusive situation. The family member in trouble reached out to the Family Crisis Center and after they were safe, they decided to stay with the family members who had intervened. They will continue to seek counseling and other services with the Family Crisis Center. The urgent need today was food and clothes, hygiene, and toiletries. So, the Family Crisis Center suggested they see Love INC. We were happy to see them and realized the food pantries had closed. We sent a private message to Hope food pantry, and Harvest House and they both agreed to make an emergency food box for them. While we were waiting to hear back from the pantries, we sent a message to Fredonia Hill Baptist Church Open Door program, and they offered as well to help them with some emergency food. We sent them on their way with a clothes voucher to the Hospice Store, toiletries and hygiene products and a bag of snacks and directions to our community partners. In just 30 minutes or less, 6 community partners collectively communicated together to support and solve this family's scary and difficult situation. Now this family has 6 different resources they can access. Communication between our community partners is essential.

Soon after, during First Baptist Church Nacogdoches's annual Service Day, Love INC was honored with a special blessing as one of the many projects their members carried out across Nacogdoches County. About 20-25 people gave our old storage units a face lift! The paint was ready, and the supplies were there and after an unexpected and generous gift we were ready! One of the dilemmas was pressure washing the units and letting them dry before the crew painted on the big day. For several weeks, we tried to find volunteers and pressure washers and the time to commit to doing it. On that Wednesday afternoon and out of desperation, we sent out a post on Facebook a plea for help. I had already rented pressure washers and our warehouse guys along with some of the office staff were ready to put all other work-related issues on hold for Thursday and Friday. We were ready to do it ourselves. No one had a problem with the chore, however, case work and other important issues involving families would have to wait. We were all a bit

It was a day of no turning back for me that what is written about Jesus in the Bible is the truth.

God offers His salvation in Jesus to the whole world. Jesus died on the cross for the sins of everyone born a sinner in Adam, all of humanity. The gospel of Jesus Christ is going forth unhindered in every place He sends His gospel. It is through His gospel preached and believed that Jesus is building His church, His body of believers here on earth. I believe all whom the Father has given the Son will come to Him and not one among them will be lost (John 6:37-39).

This takes us to the matter of Jesus justifying the ungodly. Who are the ungodly? Why do the ungodly need to be justified? What does justification have to do with a sinner's salvation? Everything. All have sinned and come short of the glory of God (Rom 3:23). It is the sin we inherited from Adam that separates us from a holy God. Adam fell because he believed the lie rather than holding fast to the truth (Gen 2:15-17; 3:6).

We have all entered into Adam's sin (Rom 5:12). It is sin which makes us ungodly before God. When Adam sinned, departing from obedience, holiness and righteousness and rejecting God's divine authority to direct his life, to tell him how to live in the garden He created, Adam's separation from God became our separation from God. Adam's sin made us all spiritual children of the devil (1 John 3:10). Where can ungodly sinners find help to escape this dilemma? In the Seed (Gen. 3:15). The Seed, which is Jesus, was born when the fullness of the time had come. He was born to remove the cause of our spiritual separation from God (John 1:29) and to reconcile us back to God (2 Cor. 5:18-20).

We did nothing to cause our sin which separated us from God. We can do nothing to remove the sin and come back into right relationship with God. One man brought sin into the world. One Man takes away sin. Where does that leave us? Guilty in Adam as long as we choose to remain in Adam. Declared not guilty (justified) through faith in Jesus if we believe His gospel (1 Cor. 15:3, 4). It is Christ who makes us righteous. Paul wrote, "For [God] made [Jesus] who knew no sin to become sin for us, that we might become the righteousness of God in [Jesus]" (2 Cor. 5:21).

The sinner who believes the truth as it is written in the Bible about Jesus Christ is declared righteous in Christ on the basis of His finished work on the cross. It is faith in Christ alone and His good works (a perfect obedient life) that God will accept on the believers behalf. Our "good" works will never be good enough to cleanse us from our sin. Works of the flesh for salvation can never remove the stench of sin emanating up to the nostrils of a holy God. God declares that all of our righteousnesses are like filthy rags (Isa. 64:6). Our works are equated to a woman on her monthly period. It is a time of her uncleanness, and the blood causes a putrid smell. God will accept a sweet-smelling aroma that comes from a life hidden in Christ.

Jesus justifies the ungodly, all whose faith is in His name. Have you been justified, declared not guilty by Jesus who offered one sacrifice for sins forever (Heb. 10:12)? No justification, no salvation. No reconciliation, no salvation. If you die without the forgiveness of your sins and the salvation of your soul that God is offering in Jesus, you will die in your sins. The stench of your sins will be forever before you in hell, a place of eternal separation from God.



As Dead as a Doornail

He is a Deacon in a Baptist Church and former Sunday School Teacher for many years, as well as Choir Director at several churches. He is also the docent in the 1919 Jail Museum in San Augustine and works three days a week. He was the director of the restoration of the old county records dating back to the 1800s.

I have used the expression "dead as a doornail" many times, and I am sure that you have, too. We are not alone. Since the 14th century people have declared things to be dead as doornails. It makes sense that inanimate objects are dead, but then so are diamonds, doughnuts, and doorknobs. So, why do we use the expression "dead as a doornail"? What are doornails, and why are they so dead?

People who study words and phrases are called "etymologists," and they are supposed to be very intelligent folk. Over the years these "etymologists" have studied this phrase and have settled on two possibilities as to the origin.

The first theory involved a door knocker that was installed on the front entry door. Door knockers date back to antiquity, but in modern times have been replaced with the doorbell. The early door knockers had a large nail that the knocker struck when hit with the top portion of the knocker. This nail was considered to be dead because the ring of the nail was deadened to a dull knock as the sound was diffused into the wooden door when struck. This large nail was considered dead because of the number of times it was struck on its head.

Then, there is this second theory. In ancient times many doors were very large and ornate, and required many nails to secure the wooden pieces. The practice was to hammer the nail through the wood pieces, and then bend the protruding nail end over to secure it. This process, similar to riveting, was called clenching.

Clenching is when you drive a nail that passes through both thicknesses of wood you are fastening together. The tip of this nail sticks out about ¼" and is then bent over and driven into the wood. Clenching adds remarkable strength to a joint. A 1948 study by the U. S. Forest Products Laboratory concluded that clenching can increase the holding power of a nail between 45 percent and 464 percent – depending on a variety of factors.

Also interesting is that the study concluded that bending the nail tip across the grain increased the holding power by 20 percent compared to a nail clenched along the grain of the wood.


Since a nail that had been clenched could never be used again, it was considered a "dead nail," and may be the source of the phrase. The old wooden doors were replete with "dead nails" holding it together.

Dickens was among the celebrated authors who liked the phrase and made a point of using it in his *A Christmas Carol*:

"I don't mean to say that I know, of my own knowledge, what there is Particularly dead about a doornail. I might have been inclined, myself, To regard a coffin nail as the deadest piece of ironmongery in the trade. But, the wisdom of our ancestors is in the simile; and my unhallowed Hands shall not disturb it, or the country's done for. You will therefore Permit me to repeat, emphatically, that Marley was as dead as a door Nail."

This theory suggests that "dead as a doornail" refers to nails that found their final resting place in doors. Since this phrase has been around since the 1300s, perhaps it is time for a 21st century upgrade. Given the ubiquity of digital downloads, I would suggest a change to "as dead as a DVD."







A Big Bend Series: Hollywood Comes to Marfa

In the autumn of 1956, Nacogdoches' Main Theater screened the blockbuster film, "Giant," starring Rock Hudson, Elizabeth Taylor and James Dean. It was an epic production, 3½ hours long, that was nominated for 10 academy awards. I saw it for the first time some years later, and I recall being transfixed at the spectacle of the biggest superstars of the era paradoxically appearing in the



nowhere land of scrub brush in the west Texas desert.

From all accounts, it was even more surreal for the denizens of nearby Marfa, Texas to see movie stars of such lofty pedigree as Elizabeth Taylor, just 23 years old, window-shopping in the tiny downtown business district. When filming, the actors would drive 17 miles to a studio-built façade of the main house of the fictional Reata ranch. After production ceased, the façade stood for three more decades, visited by countless movie buffs until it finally collapsed.



Near the production site along highway 90, you can't miss huge dioramas celebrating the actors in "Giant," including that of James Dean, who died in

an auto accident mere weeks after shooting the picture.

After filming, the cast would retire back to the Paesano Hotel (below) in Marfa, still basking nowadays in the unlikely fame accrued so many years ago.





The impact of this improbable Hollywood film production in remote west Texas added to the mystique of the area that is still present today, as Marfa has a thriving art and culture component that is worthy of a visit. Next time, in the last of this series, we will visit Marfa and the famed mystery of the Marfa lights.


Jesus and Barbeque

Jesus & Barbeque is a book about God's work in Jeremiah Moss' life. Moss is a graduate of East Texas Baptist University. He was in several of my classes at ETBU; before that he was in my history classes at Panola College. So I have known Jeremiah for many years, even before he became a Christian. I personally know much of the personal struggles and experiences of Jeremiah's personal faith journey.

The focus and essential emphasis in this book is Jesus—His work, witness and winsomeness. It is about how God has worked to redeem Jeremiah and then enable him to begin building a legacy of faith, family and barbeque. In the very beginning of his book Jeremiah employs the word "incredible" very appropriately, often describing his life story, his fellow employees, his business and his Christianity ministry as a pastor.

In Jeremiah's dedication of his book, he first uses this word to introduce "this incredible" journey. "First and foremost, I want to give all glory and honor to God, whose grace, guidance, and provision have made this journey possible. This book is a testimony to His faithfulness and the call He placed on my life to serve others through faith, family, and barbecue."

Jesus & Barbeque: Barbeque with Purpose is not just a book where the author has compiled his stories, recipes and teachings. Jeremiah records God's vision to him in calling him to barbeque and ministry. He affirms his following God's motivation and missionary outreach. In doing this witness he instructs the readers to share their stories from personal struggles and victories, but not to over-emphasize their personal failures which can often distract from Jesus' story and grace.

We need to share our stories showing our personal struggles and victories, but we must remember Jeremiah's insight not to over-emphasize our personal failures and sins. Our emphasis must ever be the work of God, not our work or our person. When we push ourselves, we merely prove the reality of our fleshly selfishness proving that sin is still controlling us and not the grace of God.

Jeremiah focuses his scriptural exposition on Matthew 13:22-23 where Jesus

deals with sowing seeds on good soil and bad soil. This whole exposition is about the seeds of God's witness in human hearts and God's work of faith in the planting, growing and harvesting experience. He ties all these ideas of food, friendship, family and how these relate to God's work in our lives, and what results from the sowing of God's word on good and bad soil. God has created the soils, the souls and the process of planting, growing and harvesting Jeremiah thus concludes that "the parable highlights the importance of understanding the soil in our

minds and hearts to grow and produce a harvest of faith and love through the seeds we plant. By doing so, we can produce abundantly for God's glory." He ties all these factors together in light of God's creative contribution to our being His born again children.

Jeremiah stresses that we need to consider ourselves and how God has worked in our lives. God comes to us and brings a new birth to spiritually dead and totally selfish people. He saves us and changes us enabling us to overcome evil and determine to oppose sin and Satan. Jeremiah's testimony is based on God's revelation to him in the Word of God. So Jeremiah stresses that the foundation of his faith is in God teaching him valuable lessons which has enabled him to claim Paul's admonition, "Therefore, whether you eat or drink, or whatever you do, do all to the glory of God" (1 Corinthians 10:31). God knows us and thus Jeremiah concludes that "a loving and all-powerful creator has purposefully created each of us with a distinct purpose. God's purpose is always accomplished because it is powered by God who never fails.

Another passage Jeremiah stresses is the parable of the talents in Matthew 25:14-30 where God reveals that we are purposefully given talents that we might

wisely invest, benefit and prosper so as to bless others in the Kingdom of God. In all these stories God strives to teach us and lead us to embrace God's living and good works and the rules for holy behavior that we might thereby magnify and glorify the Living Lord Jesus. In all this God holds all people accountable.

In this book of stories and scriptural lessons Jeremiah stresses that God has given us what we need to serve Him and be a blessing to those we associate with all through our lives. We must find our calling, fulfill our calling and follow the will of God as He leads us by the Holy Spirit. Jeremiah's journey was not just his vision but it was God's work and witness in him. He listened to God, read

His Word and sought through fasting prayer the guidance and direction of God. Jeremiah listened to God. He embraced God's guidance. He stresses the important lesson that we must begin the work God called us to do. As he sought the Lord Jeremiah found that God provided all he needed to fulfill his vision and work. We must evaluate and account for what we have; what God has given us; and what others have invested in us.

Another important factor is sharing your vision with others.

Jeremiah powerfully states, based on God's word to Habakkuk, that we must write down what God reveals to us. God's command to the prophet was "Write down the vision, make it plain upon tables" that everyone might understand it and recognize what is to be done. "When written and made tangible, it turns the idea, the dream, into a unit that unifies all into taking a stand and fighting for it courageously and relentlessly." In Jeremiah's case this became "a crusade to change lives," involving local communities and faraway places. Thus, there emerged communities connected by love and purpose, expressed in the Living Lord Jesus and the sharing of barbeque and the income resulting from those who invested in it. This is a great story of what people working and eating together can accomplish.


This book also presents an important insight into the role of community conversation and sharing. We need others to help us, to embrace our God-given vision and ministry. So this stresses the importance of God's people coming together in church life and community life that we might together overcome life's problems and thereby accomplish God's will and work. There are some essential qualities God wants to give to us and bring alive in us and through us—a sense of community (church life) and the expression of this faith family in sincere gratitude, knowledge and wisdom coming from God's reliable people. There is the quality of humility which demonstrates God's presence and power in our relationships with those we associate with. All of this highlights the importance of work in relation to God and our communities of faith, family and business. There is great value in work, helping others and serving others. I like what Jeremiah says about work. "Work is more than simply a job; it is an opportunity to satisfy the needs of others and make a big difference."

I have read Jeremiah's book many times as I've worked on reviewing and summarizing it. In so many ways I appreciate what he shares in his testimony and scriptural witness. His stress on being Christian is important. I would challenge him regarding his use, as so many others who often describe Christians as "born again." There is no other kind of Christian. You cannot be a Christian without being "born again" by the Spirit of the Living God. Many claim to be Christian, but they are not born again because they demonstrate that reality by denying God, by defaming Him, by cursing Him, by doing evil things, by cooperating with Satan and his demons.

There are so many good things in this exceptional book. I've not said very much about barbeque, but Jeremiah has a great deal to say about that cooking process; how to select the meat, how to prepare it for cooking; then how to cook it and finally how to enjoy it with others, especially in light of Jesus' living presence as we share together in fellowship and eating.







Leave the Stone Fort Museum where it is


Plans have been proposed to relocate the Stone Fort Museum; at least it is on the table as part of a Master Plan being considered by the University of Texas Regents for Stephen F. Austin State University. Three media outlets have run stories about this, although a new location has not been proposed. My suggestion is: Leave the Stone Fort Museum where it is for historical and practical reasons. Three personal reasons also apply. The column below this one, Kissin' Kuzzins, was given to me by Carolyn Reeves Ericson, a well-known Nacogdoches genealogist/historian; however, in another life, Carolyn was the curator of the Stone Fort Museum and gave her heart to that enterprise. Secondly, for a whole year, while I pursued my Master's in history at Stephen F. Austin State University, I served as a graduate assistant to Dr. Archie P. McDonald, grading his American history and Texas papers, speaking in his stead on one occasion, and helping at the East Texas Historical Association meetings. What I am about to say is the understatement of all time: Archie was all about what was best for Nacogdoches, and, as concerns the Stone Fort Museum, he wrote a booklet entitled "The Old Stone Fort." If he were living today, I seriously doubt he would want it to be relocated. Thirdly, my family owned the Old Stone Fort because my great-great-great-grandfather Zechariah Phillips Fenley was killed in the Cordova Rebellion; consequently, his widow, Rebecca Danzey Fenley, sued Vicente Cordova and won half interest in the Old Stone Fort. She sold her interest to Harriett Fenley Roberts, her sister-in-law and the wife of John S. Roberts, a signer of the Texas Declaration of Independence. So the Stone Fort Museum is near and dear to me.

Practically speaking, relocation would mean a compromise of the integrity of the Stone Fort Museum. This has already happened twice. When it was torn down in 1902, the Cum Concilio asked for the stones and reconstructed an intermediate structure on Washington Square. For the Texas Centennial, these stones and others that had to be quarried were used to build the Stone Fort Museum, where it is. In both cases, stones were pilfered from the original ones. I have had two conversations with persons in Nacogdoches, one who told me that they had a wall near their house constructed with some of the original stones. Another told me they had a fireplace in their house that utilized some of the original stones, too. Let's face it: people can be dishonest, and if the present structure is relocated, the present holdings and the materials from its present structure may be compromised. The work the two Carolyns have put into it to bring it to where it is today, i.e., Carolyn Reeves Ericson and Carolyn Spears, may be pilfered. Buy some land somewhere else to put your new science building on, but please leave the Stone Fort Museum where it is, as it is.
